## What is the necessity?

#### Halifax youth are underrepresented

55 000 between 15-24 (2011 Stats Canada)i

Only one councillor below the age of 35

#### Halifax is aging and losing young people<sup>ii</sup>

2011-2031, population aged 18-29 supposed to drop 25%


18.7% Unemployment in ages 15-24 (2013)

97% of the workforce growth from 2006-2012 were aged 45+

#### Halifax issues are youth issues

Transportation, climate action, employment, etc.

### What are the benefits?

- Increased political involvement
- Increases in voter turnout
  - Voters aged 18-19 had a 15% showing, those aged 20-29 had an 8% showing
- Improved trust in the municipal
- Will educate youth on municipal issues
- Provides insight to the Council on new issues or how current ones pertain to the younger people of Halifax



# Logistics: Connection with Regional Council

2 Councillors sit on the Council

Youth Council members will make their reports personally to Council

Want to foster a feeling of importance (not just there as tokens but are taken

seriously)



## What we have to offer:

- New and fresh political ideas
- Political interest that is just looking for a venue
- iMatter: previous political experience. Extensive environmental research regarding the HRM



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## Logistics: Engagement of all of HRM

- Open to all 16 districts to ensure a broad representation of HRM youth

- A maximum of 3 members from each district
- A maximum of 16 members on the council
- Outreach to different communities to ensure diversity
- Subsidizes travel for youth outside of Halifax Center or further than the reliable reaches of Metro Transit

## Logistics: Specific details for the proposal

- Youth council will advise on youth-specific issues and issues that are important to youth
- Work on youth civic engagement
- Present proposals to regional council
- Ages 15-24
- Monthly meetings
- Internally elected chair
- 1 year mandate, maximum 2 years on council
- A search committee made up of councillors and youth



## Examples of Canadian Municipal Youth Councils

**Edmonton Youth Council:** main objectives are to provide feedback and input to the city councillors, committees and works on projects around the city to specifically benefit youth, thorough mandate

**Toronto City Youth Council:** mirrors the Toronto City Council, has varying branches that could be a future structure for HRM if it grows

Canadian Coalition of Youth Councils: currently includes Toronto,
Mississauga and Markham but it provides a framework for future national youth
collaboration

## Why it's important youth are involved in the creation:

- We know what's going to work best for us
- We can encourage greater participation in the youth council
- We have connections
