REPORT A POTHOLE / SINKHOLE

Call 311 to report a pothole or sinkhole on HRM owned streets or sidewalks.

Potholes are caused when the asphalt on the surface of the road has deteriorated from the top, but you can still see asphalt under the hole.



Sinkholes are caused by erosion from underneath, and when you look into it, you can't see any pavement.

REPORT LITTER ON HRM OWNED STREETS, SIDEWALKS, PATHWAYS

Report scattered litter or overflowing waste bins on HRM owned streets, sidewalks, paths, walkways, between streets or in ditches by calling **311** or using the link above.




do the entire length of the road but could use some help. "I also thought of a good slogan to spread around," he said. "DYOD -

Our Parks & Recreation department has advised that all ball diamonds and natural grass sport fields are currently CLOSED with an opening date of May / June pending weather conditions. All-weather fields are open for programmed use: to book please call 311.

SPRING CLEANING

Now that the winter season has wrapped up, municipal staff have transitioned to annual spring cleanup activities across the region.

Crews are working in all areas to address litter, remove downed branches and other winter debris, and empty garbage cans in municipal parks, playgrounds, sports fields, trails and other open spaces.

All 1000 kilometers of sidewalks will be mechanically swept and cleared of debris over the next few weeks, with the initial effort focused on improving conditions in downtown Halifax and Dartmouth.

The municipality has also deployed its eight

vacuum street sweepers and two tandem broom trucks for an initial cleaning of approximately 1,500 kilometers of roadway and 3,000 kilometers of curb



in the core areas of Halifax, Dartmouth and Bedford. In areas where snow clearing was done by contractors, street and sidewalk cleaning will be completed by the same contractor, as needed.

Clearing debris from the region's bicycle lanes is also a priority, which will take place in tandem with the street cleaning work.

NEW PARKING RESTRICTIONS ON WINDGATE DRIVE



Due to concerns expressed by residents, HRM's Traffic Analysts have reviewed the issue of parking along Windgate

Drive in Beaver Bank and will be installing parking restrictions on the east side of the road (see red line in photo), from civic #977 (2nd utility pole) to the intersection at Beaver Bank Road. Staff will monitor the effects of these restrictions and may add more if required.

HALIFAX TRANSIT BEAVER BANK SERVICE CHANGES-NOVEMBER 2019

When the MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER plan was approved three years ago, changes to Beaver Bank transit service were planned to occur in August 2020. However, plans have changed a little due to software changes coming in 2020. We are now planning to make all the Sackville changes in November 2019.

The proposed changes to Route 400 will now occur in November 2019 rather than August 2020. The new routes were to be called Route 89/189 (and are still referenced as such in the Moving Forward Together Plan), they will actually be called Routes 86/186.

Route 400 Beaver Bank will become local Route 86 Beaver Bank and express Route 186 Beaver Bank. This change is a result of the truncation of the route to eliminate the low ridership segment beyond Kinsac Road. There will be a higher level of service than the former Route 400 Beaver Bank.

More detail will be provide as we approach the November 2019 implementation deadline.

BUDGET AND BUSINESS PLANS



On April 16th, Regional Council approved \$793.7-million in total municipal expenditures and a capital plan of \$164-million as part of the 2019-20 municipal budget.

Council approved a decline in the residential tax rate of 0.3 per cent, acknowledging that the average residential tax bill will increase due to growth in property assessment. The average single-family home tax bill will increase by \$43, or 2.3 per cent in 2019-20 to \$1,967. The overall average commercial tax bill will also increase by 2.3 per cent.

Mayor Savage said that: "This is a solid budget, in my opinion, reflecting Council's consistent commitment to respect the taxpayer of today and all of our citizens," ... "I'm proud of our open and transparent budgeting process and I feel we

landed in a place that ensures we continue to invest municipal tax dollars responsibly."



Bike Week is a nine-day long celebration of cycling in the Halifax Regional Municipality, from June 1-9. Activities include signature events like the **Southwest Sunday Cycle**, **MEC Bike to School Day**, and **SWITCH**, but also dozens of smaller community events, rides, workshops and safety campaigns throughout the municipality targeting cyclists of all ages and abilities.

On average, 50 events take place over 10 days encouraging over 7,000 people in the region to take part in physical activity, learn about cycling, and - of course- have fun!

Bike Week has grown from 18 events with just 800 participants in 2006, to **60** events reaching **7,000+ participants** in 2018. It is through community groups, bike enthusiasts and supporters like you that we can expand our reach and improve the lives of residents living in the municipality by encouraging them to get out and become more active.
