






JOHN McLACHLAN.

- Mayflower Tobacco Company operated on-site from 1861 until 1903
- Produced brands, such as Twist, Twelves, Navy Sixes, Mayflower, and Plant
- Competed with American tobacco companies
- The factory employed 130 people and produced 500,000lbs of product by the 1870s
- Mayflower brand was known throughout North America and won international awards





- Moirs Ltd. (candy and box manufacturing company) operated here between 1905 and 1924
- Founded by Benjamin Moir who opened a Brunswick Street bakery in 1830
- Had several Canadian branches and international agencies by 1925
- Owned by the Moirs family until 1956





- W.H. Schwartz & Sons (spice and dry food manufacturer) operated here between 1934 and 1969
- Founded by William Schwartz in 1841; became a well-known brand in 1889
- William's son was the first person in Canada to sell pure spices
- By 1930, their products were sold in over 50 countries



3. Architect or Builder



- Henry Frederick Busch (1826-1902)
- Started working for architect Henry Elliot in 1881; they formed a partnership between 1863 and 1876
- Specialized in Italianate and Gothic Revival architecture; designed West House and the Universalist Church
- Busch became well-known for his Second Empire designs, Gothic detailing, and brick construction

4a. Architectural Merit (Construction)



- Timber frame (or post-and-beam) construction, which was common through the early 1800s
- Clad with brick, following advances in construction techniques during the late 1800s
- Ground-storey floor supported by two rows of 6inch wood pillars




4a. Architectural Merit (Construction)

4b. Architectural Merit (Style)



- Constructed in the Italianate style (1850-1900)
- Strong representation; commercial buildings have a modest scale, symmetrical façade, arched windows, brick exterior, and wide cornice
- Character defining elements:
 - Three storey building w/ two-storey side wings
 - Low gable and flat roofline
 - Rubblestone foundation w/ granite corners
 - Original window fenestration
 - Segmental arch window openings with soldier voussoirs and lug sills




4b. Architectural Merit (Style)



B) Style	Points
Very rare/ early example	7 - 10
Moderately rare/ early	4 - 6
Somewhat rare/ early example	1 - 3
Not rare/ common example	0

5. Architectural Integrity



- Has good integrity given that the original form, including the T-shaped plan, and many Italianate elements exist
- Alterations include:
 - Original 12-pane windows were removed
 - Some windows have been blinded
 - Windows / doors changed to vinyl or aluminum
 - Original window on south façade enlarged
 - South wall of west wing was rebuilt and clad with metal siding

5. Architectural Integrity

6. Relationship to Surroundings



- Historical and physical connections to nearby buildings from the 19th century
- Historic built form and character is fairly continuous along the street

Points	Comments	
6 - 10	The building is an important architectural asset contributing to the heritage character of the surrounding area.	
1 - 5	The Architecture is compatible with the surrounding area and maintains its heritage character.	
0	Does not contribute to the character of the surrounding area.	



Recommendation

Should 5663 Cornwallis Street, Halifax score 50 or more points on evaluation as a heritage property under the HRM Heritage Property Program, the Heritage Advisory Committee recommends that Regional Council:

- 1. Set a date for a heritage hearing to consider the inclusion of the subject property in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality; and
- 2. Approve the request to include 5663 Cornwallis Street, Halifax in the Registry of Heritage Property for the Halifax Regional Municipality, as shown on Map 1, as a municipal heritage property under the Heritage Property Act.
