

PROPOSED BEECHVILLE BOUNDARY



In 2004 municipal staff conducted a community boundary verification project for the community of Beechville and on October 30th, 2007, Regional Council approved the boundaries that are in place today. Since then, staff and local Councillors have received feedback that the current Beechville boundary does not accurately reflect the history of the community.

Therefore, at their July 16th, 2019, meeting Regional Council requested staff consider modification to the community boundaries of Beechville with the aim of being more representative of the history of the community.

The community of Beechville, originally called Beech Hill, was first settled by refugees who had escaped from slavery during the War of 1812. Many had fought for the British in the war and for their service were granted 5000 acres near the North West Arm, an area that



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includes present-day Beechville, Chain of Lakes, and Nine Mile River. The community is one of the oldest African Nova Scotian communities in Nova Scotia.

Over the years, outside pressures, particularly the annexation of the former Halifax County by the City of Halifax in 1969, have decreased the size of the community. Throughout the 1970's and 80's the Provincial government and City of Halifax targeted large areas of Beechville for industrial development, which further eroded traditional community boundaries.

In order to determine a more accurate boundary, preliminary consultation has been undertaken with a community group in Beechville, as well as research on the history of the area and its boundaries. Based on that information we are proposing a change to the currently community boundaries of Beechville.

It is the policy of the Municipality that any adjustment to, or confirmation of, a community boundary is done in consultation with the members of that community. The goal of this project is to determine the boundary location between the communities of Beechville and the surrounding communities of Goodwood, Halifax, Otter Lake, and Timberlea, and we invite you to participate in this project.


The map (shown at the beginning of this article) illustrates the current extents of the community of Beechville (area identified by diagonal lines), and an alternative proposal

(grey shaded area) based on research and consultation with community groups. You can assist the Municipality in determining the community boundaries of Beechville by reviewing the map and providing your feedback before September 6th. Your feedback is an important part of the process in determining the community boundary locations.

Please note: any change to your community's name or boundaries will not affect your school district, electoral district, or your property taxes.

Once all the feedback has been received staff will review all the comments and write a recommendation report to Halifax Regional Council for their approval.

LEFT-TURN TRAFFIC CALMING



Some intersections will be receiving temporary rubber bump out extensions to the centre lines to help provide traffic calming measures by

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slowing speed of drivers when turning and to make the approach to crosswalks in a more perpendicular manner rather than diagonally. The following intersections will receive the temporary bump outs:

- South Park Street and Spring Garden Road
- Lacewood Drive and Dunbrack Street
- Lacewood Drive and Parkland Drive
- Cobequid Road and Glendale Drive
- Joseph Howe Drive and Dutch Village Road
- Main Street and Major Street

The rubber bump out extensions will be removed in time for winter snow removal services.

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TRAFFIC CALMING ASSESSMENT



A new <u>Traffic Calming Administrative Order</u> (AO) was approved by Regional Council to better balance emphasis on all road users when considering which streets should receive traffic calming features.

In the past, vehicle speed was the primacy factor for ranking streets in order of implementation. The new policy provides increased emphasis on mode share, pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and collision history.

PUBLIC ART PROPOSALS - HALIFAX COMMON AQUATICS FACILITY



The Halifax Regional Municipality is seeking public art proposals to be integrated in the new Halifax Common Aquatics Facility. This is a great opportunity for qualified artists to design, fabricate, and install public art. Successful artists will work in collaboration with the municipality's project team.

The Halifax Common Aquatics Facility project will include a 13,500 square foot pool with capacity for 450 people, a new playground, and a year-round pavilion with a community room, kitchenette, modular stage for performers, and natural shade areas from tree groves and overhand features of the structure.

It is anticipated the new facility will be open to the public in summer 2023.

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

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Making a respectful Land Acknowledgement now, remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
