DISTRICT BOUNDARY REVIEW



A district boundary review is required in 2022; changes coming from this review will not come into effect

until the 2024 Municipal Election.

The Municipal Government Act (MGA) requires that all municipalities in Nova Scotia conduct a review of the number and boundaries of polling districts in the municipality on a regular basis. The final decision on municipal polling districts and boundaries is made by the Nova Scotia

<u>Utility and Review Board (NSUARB)</u> and is binding on the municipality. The most recent review was conducted in 2014 and <u>the resulting</u> <u>district boundaries</u> are currently in effect.

The 2022 review is divided in two Phases.
Phase 1 - the number of districts - has been completed, and Phase 2 is now in progress. Learn more about the process and what has happened so far.

Public engagement is underway until **October** 17th. We are looking for your feedback on proposed changes to the existing electoral boundaries for the Halifax Regional Municipality, which will take effect after the 2024 Municipal election.

OUTDOOR COMMUNITY RINK GRANTS

Rink Program.

Launched in 2021, this program allows community groups to operate a community rink on municipal-owned property. Applicants can also apply for a grant of up to \$5,000 to cover insurance costs associated with operating the rink.

The Outdoor Community Rink Program was approved by Regional Council in November 2021 with an intention to support community groups advancing community-based projects while also encouraging residents to explore outdoor winter activities in their own communities.

SENIORS CARE GRANT



The <u>Seniors Care Grant</u> helps eligible Nova Scotia seniors with the cost of household and healthcare services. Grants are up to \$500 for each household. A one-time Home Heating Grant of \$250 is also available to eligible seniors to help with heating costs.

Applications for the two grants open on September 1st, 2022, and close on March 31st,




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2023. Only one person can apply for each household.

DOWNTOWN HALIFAX HERITAGE CONSERVATION DISTRICT PLAN



The Halifax Regional Municipality is seeking feedback from residents across the municipality on the Draft Downtown Halifax Heritage Conservation District (HCD) Plan.

On May 4, 2021, <u>Halifax Regional Council</u> initiated a process to create a new Heritage

The Draft HCD Plan can be found here, and includes recommendations to promote the distinct heritage values and character of these three historic areas of Downtown Halifax. Residents are encouraged to review the Plan and provide feedback by sending comments and/ or questions via email to heritage@halifax.ca until Thursday, December 1st, 2022.

An open house was held on Monday, September 12th at Halifax City Hall with municipal staff present to answer questions and discuss the policy objectives proposed in the Plan. The final documents will be presented to various committees and Regional Council for consideration and approval in the spring of 2023.

Residents can <u>subscribe</u> for project updates, including when new documents are available for review (such as the draft Regional Centre Plan and Land Use By-law amendments package).

The work to restore municipal services, cleanup and restoration is ongoing. For the latest: <u>http://halifax.ca/severeweather</u>. Residents are asked to continue to report downed municipal signs, crosswalk lights and streetlights to 311.

Municipally-owned trees that fall on private property are being removed by the

municipality. If a tree has fallen in the right of way and is blocking or impeding traffic, a sidewalk, or a bike lane – residents should call 311. For your own safety, residents are reminded to not remove trees in the right of way. Trees located on private property are the sole responsibility of the homeowner. The municipality is not responsible for removing tree waste and brush from private property. As Fiona has left many of us with fallen trees and other debris, here is some information regarding pick-up and drop-off of debris:

DEBRIS PICK-UP



The municipality is currently accepting twice the amount of tree waste bundles for organics collection. Residents may set out 10 tree waste bundles as part of their organics collection. Tree waste should be tied in armload-sized bundles. No bundle can exceed 75 pounds and no individual piece can be more than four feet long or larger than eight inches in diameter. Up to 20 paper bags of yard waste will also be accepted.

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DEBRIS-DROP OFF



Until Wednesday, October 5th, there will be a total of eight short-term tree waste drop-offs at the following locations from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.:

- 2 Lyle Street, Dartmouth
- 26 Thomas Raddall Drive, Halifax (located in the gravel lot between the Canada Games Centre and Soccer Nova Scotia)
- 50 Cheviot Hill, Porters Lake
- Kinsac Ballfield (near 1703 Beaver Bank Road), Beaver Bank
- Sheet Harbour Community Centre, 183
 Pool Rd, Sheet Harbour
- Lake Charlotte Boat Launch, 11475
 Highway 7, Lake Charlotte
- Peace Park, 67 Park Road, Musquodoboit Harbour
- Bayers Lake Industrial Park, 230
 Horseshoe Lake Drive, Halifax

Please note that the drop-off location previously announced at 144 Thornhill Drive, Dartmouth is closed.

There is no charge for using this service for tree waste. Residents will be responsible for delivering and unloading all tree waste, brush and branches at these sites at their own risk.

Construction debris, bags or other waste **will not** be accepted at these locations.

Residents can dispose of construction debris at Halifax C&D Recycling Ltd. at 16 Mills Drive, Goodwood or 188 Ross Road, Dartmouth (cash-only payments at the Dartmouth location). This is a private business, and fees apply for disposal. For more information visit halifaxcdrecycling.ca.

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HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signe in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement:

"The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Making a respectful Land Acknowledgement now, remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live and work on. It is an important step in reconciliation.

In Nova Scotia, we are all Treaty People; with that comes roles and responsibilities.
