MUNICIPALITY OPENS JUMPSTART INCLUSIVE PLAYGROUND

The Halifax Regional Municipality, with the support and funding from the Canadian Tire Jumpstart Charities and local Canadian Tire Dealers, has opened the new Jumpstart Inclusive Playground at the George Dixon Centre Park.

Over 11,000 square feet, this facility, located on Gottingen and Brunswick streets, was thoughtfully designed to accommodate physical, cognitive and sensory considerations and will provide a space for children of all ages and abilities.

Specifically, the new playground offers doublewide ramps, barrier-free and transfer-free equipment and pour-in-place rubber surfacing allowing for an accessible transition from the pathways to the play area. Further, the playground hosts accessible play structures, such as a We-Saw and We-Go-Round™ and musical instruments for auditory stimulation.

BUDGET 2022/23

The <u>Strategic Multi-Year Business Planning and Budget Process and 2023/24 Budget Outlook</u> report, presented to Halifax Regional Council on October 25th, marks the start of the 2023/24 Budget and Business Planning process. This report provides a high-level overview of the background, changes and updates, key dates and milestones, financial challenges and budget implications.

The commencement of the strategic planning process begins with the adoption of, or changes to, the multi-year strategic business planning and budget process, as well as the approval of the business planning and budget schedule.

On December 1st, 2020, Regional Council's Budget Committee approved the 2021-2025 Strategic Planning Framework and directed the Chief Administrative Officer to develop plans (Council and Administrative) in accordance with this Framework.

On January 12th, 2021, Regional Council's

Budget Committee approved the 2021-2025 Strategic Priorities Plan. This plan remains in place over the duration of the mandate of Regional Council but is reaffirmed annually.

In October 2021, Regional Council's Budget Committee approved the creation of an annual report that provides an update on progress toward the commitments in the Strategic Priorities Plan. This report, named the *Strategic Performance Report*, will be provided to Council each year in October or November, and will include highlights, accomplishments, and performance results associated with the previous year.

A 2021/22 *Strategic Performance Report* will be presented on Tuesday, November 22nd.

PARADE OF LIGHTS - NOVEMBER 19th



HalifACT WINS 3 NATIONAL AWARDS



In October, the municipality received not one, but three national

awards for its leadership in sustainability related to <u>HalifACT</u>, <u>our ambitious Climate</u> <u>Action Plan</u>. The awards were announced publicly at the Clean50 Summit in Toronto on October 6th.

HalifACT was among 26 winning projects in the category of Canada's 2023 Clean50 Top Projects, a group selected annually based on their innovation and ability to inform and inspire other Canadians.

Following the awards ceremony, both incoming and alumni members of the Clean50 voted on their favourite project. This vote resulted in HalifACT winning Canada's 2023 Clean50 Top Project of the Year.

The third honour belongs to the municipality's own Shannon Miedema, Director, Environment & Climate Change, who has been recognized in Canada's Clean50 list of 2023 honourees as winner of a Clean16 Award, Leader for the Cities Category. This well-deserved achievement recognizes Shannon's stewardship and work as a sustainability professional and top contributor in the fight against climate change.

"Canada's Clean50 Top Project Awards are amongst the awards announced annually by Delta Management Group and the Canada's Clean50 organization, to recognize the best sustainability-oriented projects completed in Canada over the prior two years," said Gavin Pitchford, CEO, Delta Management Group. "Projects are chosen based on a five "I"s criteria: Impactful, Innovative, Inspiring, Informative and can readily be Imitated."

Through these awards, the municipality reaffirms that <u>HalifACT</u> is more than a plan – it's a commitment to reducing emissions, switching to clean and reliable energy sources, and demonstrating leadership from local government.

Congrats to the entire Environment & Climate Change team on being recognized nationally for these exceptional honours.

Land Acknowledgement

The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People.

Halifax is committed to strengthening its relationship with Indigenous communities and honouring the significant contributions of Indigenous peoples. Another way the municipality has demonstrated this is by formalizing the official Land Acknowledgement:

"The Halifax Regional Municipality is located in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and traditional lands of the Mi'kmaq people. The municipality acknowledges the Peace and Friendship Treaties signed in this Territory and recognizes that we are all Treaty People."

Historically, a Land Acknowledgment is a traditional practice shared amongst Indigenous groups to recognize the Indigenous land and territory they are visiting. Making a respectful Land Acknowledgement now, remains a way to express gratitude and respect to Indigenous peoples for being stewards of the land we live
