SUBJECT: Regional Special Events Grant Report 2023/24

ORIGIN

Applications received pursuant to Administrative Order Number 2014-021-GOV – Respecting Regional Special Events Grants.

LEGISLATIVE AUTHORITY

Halifax Regional Municipality Charter Section 79A

Subject to subsections (2) to (4), the Municipality may only spend money for municipal purposes if

 (a) the expenditure is included in the Municipality's operating budget or capital budget or is
 otherwise authorized by the Municipality

Administrative Order Number 2014-021-GOV; *Respecting Regional Special Events Grants*, approved by Halifax Regional Council on May 26, 2015; Amended December 13, 2022.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Grants Committee recommend that Halifax Regional Council:

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Governed by the *Regional Special Events Grants Administrative Order Number 2014-021-GOV*, the Regional Special Events Grants program provides financial support for non-profit organizations that host events which foster positive community development, celebrate heritage, arts and culture, build bridges between diverse populations, enrich quality of life for residents and improve civic pride in the Municipality. This report details awards for the 2023/24 intake period (events occurring between April 1, 2023 and March 31, 2024). There are 4 Regional Special Events grant programs: Community Celebrations, Significant Anniversaries, Established Community Events and Cultural Events & Showcases. Staff recommends the 2023/24 Regional Special Events Grants program award 68 grants to various non-profit organizations throughout the municipality.

BACKGROUND

This report outlines the recommended Regional Special Events Grant Awards for the 2023/24 funding intake. All Regional Special Events Grants recommendations are governed by *Administrative Order 2014-021-GOV Respecting Regional Special Events Grants* (AO). Staff undertakes the grant application and evaluation process as outlined in the AO. This Regional Special Events Grant report is reviewed by the Grants Committee for recommendation to Regional Council.

DISCUSSION

Regional Special Events Grants AO

The AO for Regional Special Events Grants establishes consistent and equitable funding for community and cultural events and includes four funding programs:

- 1. <u>Community Celebrations</u> Provides support for small scale community events that are organized primarily for the benefit and enjoyment of residents, coincide with a community gathering or civic holiday, and are free to the public to attend. The maximum grant award in this program is \$1,000.
- 2. <u>Established Community Events</u> Provides support for existing community events that are organized primarily for the benefit and enjoyment of residents, are accessible to the public with free or low-cost activities, have been in existence for a minimum of three consecutive years, and have a minimum budget of \$10,000. The maximum grant award in this program is \$25,000. Option to provide up to three years of sustainable funding.
- 3. <u>Significant Anniversaries</u> Provides support for community events organized around major quarterly significant anniversaries (25th, 50th, 75th, etc.) that celebrate HRM's heritage and community and have a minimum budget of \$7,500. The maximum grant award in this program is \$10,000.

4. <u>Cultural Events & Showcases</u> – Provides support for arts and culture festivals that program strong cultural content, further the disciplines of literary, media, performing and visual arts, are accessible to the public with free or low-cost activities, have a minimum budget of \$50,000, and further the principles and objectives of the HRM Cultural Plan. The maximum grant award in this program is \$60,000. Option to provide up to three years of sustainable funding.

Three-year sustainable funding

The AO for Regional Special Events Grants provides the ability to award up to three-year funding to organizations under the Established Community Events and Cultural Events & Showcases programs. On May 17, 2022, Regional Council approved funding for these two programs awarding the full allocated budget for the 2022/23, 2023/24 and 2024/25 fiscal years. This precludes any public calls for applications until the fall of 2024, at which time the intake will open to fund events happening in the next three-year funding cycle (2025/26, 2026/27, 2027/28).

Events that receive multi-year funding are dependent on the approval of HRM's annual Operating Budget and Reserve capacity. Events are required to submit annual post-event reports for review and approval. Any concerns are noted and will be brought forward to the Grants Committee for discussion. Not all final event reports have been submitted to staff; however, there is ongoing communication and no immediate concerns with any of the organizations. Staff acknowledge that for many of the community events the administrative process is performed by volunteers. Staff will continue to work with groups to improve the timeline of the final reporting process. All final reporting requirements must be received prior to the release of any future grants.

Eligibility

In total, there were 15 applications submitted for review in the 2023/24 grant intake process to fund Community Celebrations and Significant Anniversaries. These event grant programs offer an annual intake. Of the 15 submissions, 14 were deemed eligible and recommended for funding, and one application was deemed ineligible. All event information on the 15 applications can be found in Attachment 1.

Ineligible

One application is not recommended for funding: Live on Agricola. The organization applied in the Community Celebrations program and have been notified of the ineligibility. Live on Agricola is a 13-week concert series and as per the AO, a Community Celebration is awarded to an organization delivering an event that is less than five days in duration; therefore, is ineligible.

Evaluation

As per the Regional Special Events Grants AO, all applications are evaluated on:

- 1. <u>Community Engagement</u> evaluated based on volunteer involvement, diversity, accessibility, attendance and programming;
- 2. <u>Community Cultural Development</u> based on the provision of arts and cultural programming and experiences;
- 3. <u>Demonstrated Financial Need</u> evaluated on access to potential sponsorship, as well as the ability to self-fund; and
- 4. <u>Demonstrated Added Value to the Community</u> evaluated on the impact of the experience that would have otherwise not been available to the community in which the event is held.

Summary of Recommended Funding

The Community Celebrations, Established Community Events and Significant Anniversaries programs have a total budget of \$215,000 funded from the Operating Budget (C760). The Cultural Events & Showcases program has a budget of \$200,000 funded from the Community and Events Reserve (Q621). As noted, Regional Council has allocated funding of \$211,025 in the Established Community Events program leaving \$3,975 to fund Community Celebrations and Significant Anniversaries. Coming out of the pandemic, an

increase in the number of community event applications were received, as well as an unexpected Significant Anniversary application. Staff recognize the importance of hosting events within the community post pandemic for the benefit and enjoyment of residents of the municipality. Therefore, with the increase in applications for the 2023/24 intake staff recommend event grant awards outlined in this report would exceed the operating budget (C760) by \$8,575. The Community and Events Reserve (Q621) has unused grants carried forward from previous years and has capacity to cover the increase staff are recommending for grant awards.

The proposed Regional Special Events funding amounts for the 2023/24 intake are outlined in Table 1 below.

COVID-19 Ongoing Approach to Funding

For 2023/24, in-person, live event activity is expected to be held and is encouraged. This year's funding is to provide support to festivals and events as they re-establish live, in- person event delivery for the public's benefit. Therefore, it is recommended that funding be awarded to organizations that deliver events under the following scenarios:

- 1. 100% of the grant to organizations that deliver live, in-person events;
- 2. 100% of the grant to organizations that deliver hybrid events in which the main event is delivered to live, in-person audiences but there is an opportunity to attend an online, virtual, or digital component which broadens audience engagement;
- 3. Should public health restrictions be reintroduced, 50% of the grant to organizations where there is the intent to return to a live event format but due to public health restrictions no in-person live events are permitted, but an online, virtual, or digital event is delivered; and,
- 4. 0% of the grant to organizations where there is the ability to return to a live, in-person event format, but the preference of the event organization is to remain digital/virtual.

Grants Committee -7 - June 12, 2023

If the impacts of COVID-19 prevent the ability to host in-person, hybrid or virtual events and festivals, no grant award will be released.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The allocated allotment of \$215,000 to fund Community Celebrations, Significant Anniversaries and Established Community Events recommendations can be accommodated in the approved 2023/24 operating budget for Community/Civic Events, account C760-6919. The balance of \$8,575 will be accommodated from the Community and Events Reserve (Q621) unused grants carried forward from previous years. All 2024/25 recommendations are subject to availability of funds and final approval of the 2024/25 operating budget.

All Cultural Events & Showcases recommendations can be accommodated in the approved 2023/24 Operating Budget – C760 Community/Civic Events funded from the 2023/24 Community Events Reserve Q621. All 2024/25 recommendations are subject to availability of funds and final approval of the 2024/25 budget.

All Cultural Events & Showcases recommendations are subject to availability of Community & Events Reserve, Q621 funds. These grants are processed through operating account C760 – Community/Civic Events.

Community and Event Reserve, Q621 is used to provide funding to attract and host exceptional large – scale sporting and tourism events that create significant economic impacts, promote Halifax as a multi – experiential event destination and attract tourists to HRM for multiple day visits. Reserve is also to provide funding to community non–profit and public institutions in support of major capital initiatives by facilitating the development of significant community infrastructure in order to realize tangible cultural, sectorial and economic impacts. Funding to the reserve is 40% of Marketing Levy from Hotel Sales, and transfers from operating budget. Withdrawals are for supporting events that support tourism and economic development, cultural / heritage projects, significant community infrastructure and public art. The recommended allocation of grants does not have a negative impact on the reserve as this allocation is within the 2023/24 approved withdrawals from reserve.

There are no outstanding funds owing to the municipality by any of the recommended applicants.

RISK CONSIDERATION

There are no significant risks associated with the recommendations in this report. The risks considered rate Low. To determine this, consideration was given to financial and reputational risk.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Information regarding program eligibility and applicant timelines are posted on the HRM website. Staff contacted all previously funded Regional Special Events Grants recipients within the past two years advising of the 2023/24 intake opening and deadline date. Communication is ongoing with program clients on the status of events.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

No environmental implications were identified.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. The Grants Committee may choose to recommend that Regional Council amend the amount of any event grant in accordance with AO 2014-021-GOV within the budget capacity of C760 and Q621.
- 2. The Grants Committee may choose to recommend that Regional Council accommodate the balance of \$8,575 to fund the staff recommended amounts of Community Celebrations and Significant Anniversaries events through the Parks & Recreation 2023/24 Operating budget.

Ineligible Events

Upon review of the applications, one event was deemed ineligible for funding as a potential Community Celebrations event due to the duration exceeding the less than five days criteria set within Administrative Order 2014-021-GOV Respecting Regional Special Events Grants.
