BACKGROUND

A presentation pertaining to a proposal by Walk 'n' Roll Halifax for a community led Accessibility Policy & Action Plan for the municipality was brought forward to the Accessibility Advisory Committee for consideration at its meeting held on January 16, 2017 (Attachment 1).

DISCUSSION


