

## **Municipality Launches Bid for Smart Cities Challenge**

The Halifax Regional Municipality has launched a bid for the Smart Cities Challenge with the goal of addressing access to affordable, healthy food in our communities.

The Government of Canada has issued a challenge, stretching from coast to coast, for the best ideas to improve the lives of Canadians. The <u>Smart Cities</u> <u>Challenge</u> will award \$50 million to the submission with the best plan to use innovation, data, and technology to solve an important issue in that city.

As many as one in seven people in Halifax lack access to affordable, healthy food. Those most affected are seniors, low income families, newcomers, people with disabilities and single parents. This issue of food insecurity has long lasting negative impacts on physical, mental and social health and overall community wellbeing.

The municipality is working with the Halifax Partnership, United Way Halifax and other partners to submit an application by April 24 that focuses on addressing this critical issue.

Residents are asked to help by completing the online <u>survey</u> designed to gather insights and perspectives regarding barriers to accessing affordable, healthy food in the Halifax Regional Municipality. Feedback will be

used to inform the municipality's submission to the Smart Cities Challenge as well as help shape ongoing collaborative efforts to combat poverty in our region.

#### **Potholes**

With the arrival of Spring comes the many potholes that need to be repaired. The municipality repairs potholes in your area based on a simple priority system.

High-priority potholes are any with a depth of more than 8 cm. Staff will repair these potholes as follows:

- Main arterial roads: within 7 business days
- Major collector roads: within 7 business days
- Minor collector roads: within 14 business days
- Local roads: within 30 business days
- Potholes with a depth of less than 8 cm are filled as resources permit.

The Great Nova Scotia Pick-Me-Up is Nova Scotia's largest volunteer-driven community clean-up program, promoting litter clean-ups across the province. Since their start in 1988, Clean Foundation has provided supplies and support to

participants (individuals, groups, businesses, schools) to carry out community-based clean-ups.

Litter is an eyesore, poses health risks, affects water quality, and is often mistaken as food by wildlife. Studies show that litter begets litter, meaning people tend to litter in areas where there is already garbage on the ground.
