Subject: Councillor Austin – Lancaster Woodland Intersection		
Motion for Council to Consider:		
That Halifax Regional Council direct the CAO to work with staff of the Nova Scotia Department of Transportation and Infrastructure to:		
<ol> <li>Develop a functional plan for improvements (including consideration of a roundabout) to the intersection of Woodland Avenue, Highway 118, Lancaster Drive and Micmac Boulevard,</li> <li>Transfer of a portion of provincial Highway 118 southwest of the intersection to Halifax Regional Municipality, and</li> <li>Report back with recommendations to Halifax Regional Council</li> </ol>		
<b>Reason:</b> The intersection of Lancaster Avenue, Woodland Avenue, Mic Mac Boulevard and Highway 118 is an area of shared jurisdiction. HRM owns Lancaster and Mic Mac Boulevard, while the Province owns the Woodland 118 corridor all the way to Ryland Avenue (see attached map).

Growth in the area and beyond in Dartmouth Crossing and the suburban areas that feed into		

Growth in the area and beyond in Dartmouth Crossing and the suburban areas that feed into Highway 118 has meant a steady increase in traffic volume. Data from HRP indicates that speed is a concern on Woodland Avenue and varies considerably depending on whether the light at the intersection for inbound traffic is green. Motorists encountering a green light often don't adjust their speed to city conditions until they're well down Woodland Avenue. There have been frequent accidents at the intersection (60 from 2010 – 2014) and pedestrian access across is problematic.

The Province identified a roundabout as a potential solution several years ago, but work never proceeded due to competing priorities and because of the complexities over shared jurisdiction. Any solution to address this problematic section of road needs to be a shared project between HRM and the Province.
