HRM BIKE WEEK JUNE 1 - 10



INTEGRATED MOBILITY PLAN



On December 5th, 2017, Halifax Regional Council adopted the <u>Integrated Mobility Plan</u> (IMP) as a framework for amending Halifax's Regional Plan, and to guide decisions relating to mobility. The IMP will direct investment in active transportation, transit, and the roadway network to improve links between people and their communities.

The IMP is built around four pillars: **Connected**; **Healthy; Sustainable; and Affordable**. The IMP will offer citizens improved access to daily destinations, help lower emissions, reduce the need for individual car ownership, support vibrant and livable neighbourhoods, and improve wellness by facilitating healthy lifestyles.

Are you 'emergency ready'?

Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency's (HRFE's) Emergency Management Division is urging you to become 'emergency ready'. No one knows the risks in your home and around your neighbourhood better than you. Analyze the situation through the eyes of someone who will need to act quickly. What are the potential hazards?

The Emergency Management Division's role in an emergency is to ensure the safety and security of residents, their properties, and the environment by providing a prompt and coordinated response to an emergency.

But residents play a crucial role in ensuring their own safety as well. Being 'emergency ready' requires examination of three key areas:

- Know the risks
- Make a plan
- Get a kit

Every household needs an emergency plan. Members of the home may not be together when an emergency occurs. Plan how to meet or how to contact one another, and discuss what you would do in different situations.

In the case of an emergency, you should be prepared for 72 hours. There may be certain

situations where you are not able to, or it is not safe to evacuate your home. You should be prepared to be self-sufficient in your home for 72 hours (or seven to 10 days in a health emergency).

DID YOU KNOW

If your vehicle is seized by Halifax Regional Police or Parking Enforcement you can visit <u>Police Headquarters at 1975 Gottingen Street in</u> <u>Halifax</u> to have your vehicle released. For the vehicle to be released, the registered owner must present the following documents:

- Driver's license (or government issued ID)
- Vehicle permit (registration)
- Proof of insurance for the vehicle

TICK SAFETY

Everyone who spends time outside – even in urban and suburban areas – is at risk of being bitten by a tick. There



are several kinds of ticks in the province, but only the blacklegged tick carries the bacteria and virus that cause tick borne diseases, such as Lyme disease.

Nova Scotia reports the highest per capita rate of confirmed Lyme disease in the country, with experts warning that 2018 will be the worst season yet for the black legged ticks that cause Lyme disease. <u>Find out how to protect yourself</u> from ticks, how to check for them and how to dispose of a tick.


Engorged blacklegged tick.

DARTMOUTH SPORTSPLEX AIMING FOR DECEMBER RE-OPENING



I am excited to announce that the Dartmouth Sportsplex is set to re-open before the end of the year. The recreation facility has been undergoing an extensive multi-million-dollar revitalization over the past year with work scheduled to conclude in November. Once construction crews clear out, hiring and training of staff completed, and; new equipment installed, there will be tours of the facility and various 'Come and Play' events hosted in December.

All programs and services will be up and running in January, at which time there will also be a grand re-opening event.

The original re-opening date was targeted for early fall; however, unforeseen circumstances resulted in delays such as the process of delicately chipping away at the old foundation and rock surfaces in and around the facility taking longer than anticipated. Contractors discovered additional repair work was required once some sections of the building were removed. The arena will re-open on September 10th for hockey and ice rentals. The track will also be available this fall for walkers and runners.

The revitalized Dartmouth Sportsplex will include a new double gymnasium, new pool attractions – such as a large waterslide, climbing walls, children's splash area, and additional accessibility features – a new fitness centre with three fitness studios, and new community spaces.

The facility will also feature plenty of glass, with natural light and stunning views throughout the facility.

RESTRICTING TOBACCO USE AT OUTDOOR FACILITIES POLICY



As of February 26th, 2018, the Dartmouth North Community Centre and the entirety of its outdoor property was designated a smoke free zone (including vaping and marijuana) in accordance with Halifax's policies regarding outdoor recreation spaces

approved by Council in 2009. This also aligns with proposed changes to the Nova Scotia Smoke-Free Places Act which will mean no smoking or vaping of cannabis or tobacco on or within 20 meters of:

playgrounds located in an outdoor public space.

- a publicly owned sport and recreation event or venue, located in an outdoor public space.
- On or within nine metres of public trails in provincial parks and on provincial beaches, except for within the boundaries of a rented campsite.

Smoking of any kind in these areas will carry a fine of up to \$2,000.


OPENING OF DR. JOHN SAVAGE HOUSE - FREEDOM FOUNDATION


The service was launched on January 17th, 2012 and is nearing 20,000 rides provided. The service is made possible through donations by various sponsors including municipal District 6 Capital funding.

DISTRICT FUNDS 2018/19

Every fiscal year, each district receives funds for two accounts that are governed by two separate policies: a) The <u>District Activity Fund</u>, b) The <u>District Capital Fund</u>.

The District Activity Fund, often called The Discretionary Fund, is designed to fund smallerscale community events and activities, or; to provide funding for local organizations. Recipients of District Activity funds must be a charity or local non-profit community group, or a special event.

The starting balance for 2018/19 was \$4,312.50. The following table shows the list of groups and funding amounts provided to date:

The District Capital Fund is used to fund largerscale capital development projects and infrastructure enhancements that are deemed to benefit the entire community. Examples of capital projects eligible to receive funding include park and community facility upgrades, or maintenance projects to improve common areas.

The starting balance for 2018/19 was \$94,000. The following table shows the list of groups and funding amounts provided to date:

Two tragic fires occurred that morning, on Primrose Street and Brule Street. Thanks to the fast action of neighbors and HRM's Fire & Emergency Services, the fire was successfully fought. We mourn the loss of life and send prayers of comfort to the family and friends of the neighbour taken from us in this tragedy. We empathize with those who experienced the traumatic event and offer encouragement to face the immediate future as they rebuild their lives.

The community of Dartmouth North once again proved they are a caring, compassionate, takeaction, love-my-neighbor community. The list of organizations and people to thank is huge but must start with our Fire and Emergency Service Department who rushed to the scene to save lives and property. Members of Dartmouth Mosque – although commencing the holy month of Ramadan - alerted fire services on their way to morning prayer when the fire was noticed, then proceeded to provide breakfast and lunch for residents who were displaced by the fire.

The Canadian Red Cross Disaster Management Team, The Salvation Army, Islam Association of Nova Scotia, The Dartmouth North Community Centre, Disaster Animal Response Team (DART), MLA Susan Leblanc, Sobey's Wyse Road, the Community Health and Wellness Team and many others came forward to assist.

I am proud of the residents of Dartmouth North for rallying and facing this challenge with love, strength and the resolve to not let one



neighbor feel abandoned nor forgotten.

The municipality's annual fireworks show, above Halifax Harbour, will be followed by a performance from international DJ, Skratch Bastid.


Parking, transit, and other municipal program and service level adjustment details will be announced prior to Canada Day.
