

## OCTOBER IS MI'KMAQ HISTORY MONTH

There are many events planned throughout the month of October in celebration of Mi'kmaq History Month commencing on Treaty Day – October 1st. Its purpose is to promote public awareness about the Mi'kmaw culture and heritage for all citizens of Nova Scotia.



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On December 8, 2015, Regional Council adopted a Statement of Reconciliation, and the municipality has since taken several important steps that have begun to take us down the path of reconciliation.

Chanie Wenjack was a 12-year-old boy who died while fleeing a residential school. The Downie Wenjack Fund was established to continue the conversation on



the legacy of residential schools, and to help the healing process through a combination of awareness and education.

Halifax Regional Council has created a dedicate space in Halifax City Hall. This project is done in collaboration with <u>Gord Downie Chanie Wenjack Fund</u>. The Legacy Space in City Hall will provide information about Chanie Wenjack and reconciliation for staff and visitors.

The official opening will be on October 4<sup>th</sup> at Halifax Hall, City Hall, 1841 Argyle Street, Halifax.

#### **CANNABIS**

The federal government has approved recreational cannabis use effective October 17, 2018.

The following information table is from a staff report that was before Regional Council on June 19, 2018 regarding By-Law N-303 - an Amendment to By-law N-300, Respecting Nuisances - Municipal Framework for Legalizing Cannabis, and Proposed By-law P-602, an Amendment to By-law P-600, Respecting Municipal Parks. The table outlines the three levels of government and their responsibilities in relation to Cannabis regulations.

### DEDICATION OF NEW HALIFAX TRANSIT FERRY – RITA JOE FERRY



Rita Joe was one of the names selected for naming a new Halifax Transit vessel through a naming contest held in the spring of 2017. 11,000 votes were cast and from that, the two names chosen were Vincent Coleman and Rita Joe. The Vincent Coleman Ferry was dedication in March 2018.

The Rita Joe Ferry will be dedicated at a ceremony commencing at 10:00 a.m. on October 25<sup>th</sup> at the Alderney Ferry Terminal, Dartmouth.

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# REMEMBER - EVERY INTERSECTION IS A CROSSWALK - MARKED OR UNMARKED



The Nova Scotia Driver's Handbook states in Chapter 2 Rules of the Road that: Every intersection has a crosswalk. Many are unmarked. Drivers must yield to pedestrians at all intersections, whether crosswalks are marked or unmarked.



Pedestrians must follow the rules of the road as well. Remember to look left, right, and left again before crossing a street. Watch for turning vehicles.

### **STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES**



stop sign is extended on school buses. It is illegal to pass a school bus from either direction when its red lights are flashing. In Nova Scotia, running a red light or passing a school bus with its lights flashing carries a fine of almost \$400 and six points.
