
MPS and LUB Amendment - Site Specific Asphalt Plant St. Margarets Bay

Regional Council October 16, 2018

Application

Application by Scotian Materials Ltd. to amend the MPS and LUB for Planning Districts 1 and 3, to enable an asphalt plant on a portion of PID# 41457821 (approx. 4 hectares in size within an existing quarry), located approximately 1 km northwest of Highway 103 and 1.5 km west of Little Indian Lake, Head of St. Margaret's Bay.






Asphalt Plant

- An asphalt plant is equipment that combines aggregates, sand, bitumen and filler material in specific proportions to produce asphalt concrete.
- The asphalt mixing plant heats aggregate and mixes it with bitumen and other adhesive substances to prepare the hot mix asphalt that is used as a paving material.
- Proposal: Dry System and Mobile





Context



- MPS Designation: Resource
- LUB Zone: Mixed Resource 2 (MR-2)
- Permits a range of land uses
- Asphalt plants not a listed use in MPS/LUB
- All surrounding lands are owned by DNR

Background

- Regional Council initiated Plan Amendment process April 28, 2015
 - ➤ Directed staff to consider amendments to MPS and LUB for Planning Districts 1 & 3 to enable an asphalt plant for lands north of Highway 103 and west of Little Indian Lake
- June 1, 2015 Public Information Meeting (PIM)



Background

- September 12, 2016 Regional Council additional community consultation
- September 2016 applicant created Community Liaison Committee (CLC)
- January 25 and 26, 2017 two days of community consultation (HRM)
- NWPAC September 6, 2017



Community Liaison Committee (CLC)

- Formed in September 2016;
- Met monthly;
- Fed information back into the community and added information to the public record;
- HRM observer only, <u>not</u> an HRM initiative;
- Concluded September 2017 findings, neither for or against the proposed asphalt plant -- found that the proponent of the asphalt plant responsive to community concerns.

Community Consultation

- Public information meeting June 1, 2015 and 2 community open houses on January 25 and 26, 2017
 - Public Information Meeting (PIM) June 1, 2015
 - over 500 attendees;
 - Comments against the proposal reflected concerns as follows:
 - Environmental impacts
 - Health impacts
 - Decrease in property values
 - Increased Truck Traffic
 - Loss of recreational opportunities

Community Consultation

Open House: January 25 and 26, 2017

Approximately 460 persons attended the two Open Houses. Of these participants 330 responded to the staff questionnaire.

 High proportion of the respondents were against locating the Asphalt Plant on the subject lands for similar reasons.

North West Planning Advisory Committee

On September 6, 2017, the NWPAC reviewed the proposal for an asphalt plant on the subject property and recommended against changing the MPS and LUB as they considered that the location was not an appropriate site for an asphalt plant.





Proposed Amendments



- Site specific policy to permit an asphalt plant on a portion of the subject lands – 4 hectares within the existing quarry with access to Ingramport Interchange only
- New schedules in the MPS and LUB showing only the lands affected





Distance Separation from Asphalt Plant 2.6 kms & 2.3kms

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Issues Raised at September 10, 2018 NWCC

- Letter from Dexter Construction (received Sept 7, 2018)
- What has changed to warrant consideration of the application since 1995?
 - Dated MPS policies (1988)
 - Rock quarry established since adoption of MPS policies (2013)
 - Planning application



Staff Rationale

- Existing land use is a quarry asphalt plants are typically in conjunction with this use;
- An asphalt plant operated on adjacent site in 2014;
- Site specific to minimize impact and does not introduce additional industrial uses or other asphalt plants;
- Surrounding lands are owned by the Crown, future expansion unlikely;
- Adequate separation distance to sensitive residential uses to mitigate impacts (environment, health and property values); and
- Additional level of regulation NS Environment permit under Environment Act – siting, distance separation (360m), air emissions, odour control, particulate emissions (dust), sound levels, surface water, and waste water.



Staff Recommendation:

That Regional Council approve the proposed amendments to the MPS and LUB for Districts 1 and 3 (St. Margarets Bay), as set out in Attachments A and B of the report dated July 11, 2018.
