ZATZMAN SPORTSPLEX

After two years of renovations, the Zatzman Sportsplex is almost set to reopen this month. The \$28 million renovation project included upgrading the child care facilities, new gym and pool equipment and a new pool. These renovations were all aimed at making the Sportsplex more accessible and ready to better serve our communities.

Thank you to the Zatzman family for their generous donation towards the facility in honour of the late Joseph Zatzman, a local businessman. The new Zatzman Sportsplex will reopen on Nova Scotia Heritage Day (February 18th), with regular operations starting on Monday, February 25th.

MOBILE PAYMENT FOR PARKING

All 1,485 municipal parking meters will now be offering a mobile payment option through <u>HotSpot</u>.

HotSpot offers the option for remote top ups, reminds you when the meter is almost up and even provides a refund if you don't use the full time you paid for. Coin payment will still be accepted as well. For more information, see our <u>website</u>.

ABERDEEN COURT PARK PLAYBOX

The municipality is implementing a Playbox pilot project in the community of East Dartmouth, planned for Spring 2019 in Aberdeen Park.

A Playbox is a metal jobsite box filled with a collection of equipment, ranging from sports gear, lawn games, jump ropes and a variety of recreation equipment that park visitors can borrow for free and then return to the box.

Community consultations took place on January 31st to get input on the equipment we will include in the box. The objective of the Playbox is to provide free community access to the unlocked box of equipment, along with engaging support of residents to maintain and monitor the Playbox.






Halifax Water will be hosting a community information session Monday February 4th from 6:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m. at the Woodlawn United Church to provide information about the water, wastewater and stormwater system enhancements happening this summer on Wanda Lane, Tobin Drive and Ronald Court.

Pending council approval, the municipality will also be undertaking various street improvements including curb, gutter and sidewalk work, as well as the replacement of the bridge on Tobin Drive. Anyone interested in or affected by this project is welcome to drop-in at any time during the session.

ICE THICKNESS

Dartmouth is the city of lakes, and it's great to get out and enjoy our lakes over the winter months with an outdoor skate, however it is important to be extra cautious and make sure the ice is thick enough to support activity. The municipality tests the ice thickness of more than 80 lakes every week and results are posted online.

Ice thickness should be:

- 15 cm for walking or skating alone
- 20 cm for skating parties or games
- 25 cm for snowmobiles

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

Budget season is a great time for Councillors and residents to find out more about the municipal services we offer. Take a look at some of the highlights from the budget presentations we have received so far:

Board of Police Budget

Statistics & Accomplishment

Integrated Emergency Services (Dispatch) - April 1 - December 31, 2018:

- Dispatched to 121,671 calls for service (HRP: 86,297 / RCMP: 35,374).
- 99,134 calls to 911 and 10,253 fire calls.
- 144,435 calls to 490-5020 (non-emergency line)
- 88 total unionized staff (8 full time supervisors / 68 full time staff and 12 part time).

Statistics and Notable Investigations and Charges laid:

- Charged approximately 30 people in various dispensary investigations
 - \$27,740 of cash seized, \$51,877.09 (51.88 kg) of marijuana, \$2,288.29 (2.29kg) of cannabis resin in these investigations.
- Responded to and laid charges following a complaint of financial mismanagement involving the expenses of a former CEO of the IWK Health Center.

COMMUNITY GRANTS PROGAM



ROAD SAFETY TIPS

We all have a role in keeping each other safe on our roads. Some helpful reminders for intersection safety are listed below:

- If available push the button to use overhead flashing lights for extra visibility.
- Look all ways before you cross the street. Just because you have a walk light doesn't mean a vehicle can or will stop.
- Pedestrians and drivers should make eye contact and watch out for each other.
- Don't start to cross when hand is flashing or the countdown timer has started, it's against the law.
- Every intersection has a crosswalk. Some are marked, others aren't. Either way, drivers must stop for pedestrians waiting to cross or when they're already in a crosswalk.
- Whether driving or walking, pay attention to what you're doing. It's against the law to have a cell phone in hand while driving, unless you're calling 9-1-1.
- If you're turning left or right on a green light, take extra care to make sure no pedestrians are crossing before you proceed.

SNOW

We've been fortunate to have a fairly mild winter this year, but our crews and contractors have still had to provide clearing for 14 snow events that required significant clean up.

During winter weather events, our contracted and inhouse crews are responsible for approximately 3,844 lane kms of streets, 1,000 kms of sidewalks and approximately 2,300 bus stops across the region. This requires a very strategic approach so we prioritize streets and sidewalks based on things like traffic volumes and slope. Before a forecasted snow event, crews may apply brine (salt water) and salt to help prevent ice and snow from sticking to the roadway.

We aim to have residential streets passable with two lane widths as soon as possible within 24 hours of the snow stopping.

During the snow, all of our equipment is deployed and working as quickly as possible to get roadways cleared. If you have concerns about the snow clearing in your area, please call 311 so your issue can be logged and forwarded to the appropriate staff.
