What is an Armoured Rescue Vehicle (ARV)?

- Has ballistic protection
- Designed to provide protection and prevention
 - Safe haven
 - High-risk operations
 - Natural disasters
- Large enough to carry several people



Key features & functions

- Safely remove people from dangerous situations
- Ability to engage with existing equipment
- Secure environment for officers to respond to a variety of emergency calls
- There is no weaponry or aggressive equipment on ARVs
- Side portals and roof hatch
- Skip shield
- Manual or powered ram



Canadian landscape

- Canadian agencies have increasingly been using ARVs over the last decade
- Models and types have evolved from tactical use to rescue response in the case of active shooters and threats
- Many major centres and provincial capitals use ARVs as part of their critical incident deployment

Evolution of critical response

 HRP has trained Critical Incident Commanders, Crisis Negotiators and Emergency Response Team members

- All tactics to engage require proximity to the target, including:
 - Rescue
 - Tactical arrest or execution of warrant
 - Harsh environments



Why does HRP need an ARV?

- Crises can happen here
- What police officers face is changing each year, and we have to be prepared
- It is critical to have capability to respond in a tactical and prepared way
- The ARV provides a level of safety for both officers and members of the public
- Logical next step in our critical response to major critical incidents
