HOMELESSNESS PROJECT WARMING CENTRE—GATEWAY COMMUNITY CHURCH

The Sackville Area Warming Centre opened its doors this past winter. Their operating hours are Thursday and Friday nights from 10pm–5:45am for up to 7 people at any one time who are 16 years of age and over. They will stay open until the end of the first week in May, unless the weather is very cold necessitating them to continue. They provide hot drinks, soup and sometimes other snacks, in a warm, safe environment. Guests can self-refer or be referred by an agency and should come to the back door of Gateway Community Church, 10 Beaver Bank Road. The team will do an intake process with each person and welcome them into their space. The service area is not only all of Sackville, but also includes Beaver Bank, Wellington, Waverley, Fall River, and Bedford.

EMERGENCY WARMING CENTRE—SACKVILLE LIBRARY

The Emergency Management Division has partnered with the Halifax Library to create a space that those in need can get go to if they need to protect themselves from extreme temperatures. This is not just for those winter moments, but also during those brief extreme hot moments that we have here in the Municipality. We became aware of pockets of vulnerable populations throughout the Municipality where there was a lack of safe spaces for some of our citizens to go. Luckily while working with other Business Units and local Councillors, it was a well-supported idea. The Sackville Library will be the first ever center in our Municipality where we can open the doors to citizens at need with pre-determined criteria and support it with both staff and volunteers.

PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS ON GLENDALE DRIVE

I am happy to say that marked crosswalks across Glendale Drive at Smokey Drive and Rankin Drive will be installed to provide pedestrian connectivity to the Sackville Greenway Trail. Municipal staff will be installing two RA-5 lights across Glendale Drive at Rankin Drive and Smokey Drive in the 2019 construction season. RA-5 crosswalk lights include pedestrian pushbuttons and both overhead and side mounted flashing lights. These lights will be the same as what was installed along Glendale over the last few years at Chandler, Pinehill and Raymond. This will greatly increase pedestrian visibility and safety while crossing Glendale.

THE DEN—ACADIA CENTRE

Since opening its doors at the end of November, an average of 60 youth per week have attended the drop-in program that runs Monday through Wednesday. Committed to a youth-led approach to service provision, the youth have been taking an active role in making The Den a safe and inclusive space for all. Each month the youth come together as a community to set/review community standards for the space and brainstorm what programs they would like to take place.

Beginning in April the following programs will run in The Den:

P.O.S.S.E: Peer Outreach Support Services and Education

POSSE is a youth leadership development, human rights & harm reduction peer outreach project for youth, by youth, between the ages of 15–30 years. Every Thursday 6–9 p.m.

Mental Health First Aid:

Hosted by Bedford Sackville Community Health Teams April 24th, 4:30–8:00 p.m. Weekly until May 16th.

ACCESSIBILITY IMPROVEMENTS TO KNOX UNITED CHURCH

The addition of an elevator makes the facility more inclusive and accessible for all to attend events such as the monthly Community Outreach Meal Events (C.O.M.E.)—a free meal for anyone who chooses to attend; take-out is also available.

SACKAWA CANOE CLUB RECEIVES INFRASTRUCTURE FUNDING

Investing in recreational infrastructure helps communities come together and stay active. The governments of Canada and Nova Scotia recognize that strategic investments in recreational infrastructure play a key role in supporting dynamic communities while creating good jobs that help grow the middle class.

The Government of Canada is contributing over \$436,000 through the National and Regional Projects. The Government of Nova Scotia is contributing over \$722,000, with the Halifax Regional Municipality providing \$75,000 in funding. The Sackawa Canoe Club is providing the remainder of project funding and donations in kind.

Once complete, the new 9,200 square foot sports and recreation centre will service the communities of Sackville, Beaver Bank, Mount Uniacke, and Hammonds Plains, as well as the greater Halifax Regional Municipality. The facility will provide sport and community programming for residents, visitors, seniors and persons with disabilities of all ages, meeting the needs of a growing community. It will also provide a year-round training centre for the canoe club and local paddling programs, improved boat storage, and community event space that will increase economic opportunities in the region.

NEW LEFT TURN SIGNALS AT BEAVER BANK ROAD AND WALKER AVENUE

Thank you to the provincial Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal (NSTIR) and MLA Brad Johns for helping to press the importance of improving safety at the intersection of Beaver Bank Connector and Old Sackville Road, by installing the infrastructure required for left-turn signals at this intersection. The province is also considering a lower speed limit for this area.
