DID YOU KNOW...

David Jones, archaeologist and historian, explains that Halifax used to celebrate Natal Day on June 21st to commemorate the founding of Halifax in the summer of 1749. Dartmouth had for many years observed the Natal Day of Halifax on June 21st but changed it to August in 1895 to coincide with the expected arrival of the first train to Dartmouth over the new branch railroad. An August date would also commemorate the landing of 353 settlers from the ship *The Alderney* in late August 1750. "*The summer* of 1895 is to be particularly noted because in that year was held our (Dartmouth) first annual celebration – an attraction which has continued with few interruptions down to the present day." Excerpt from: The Story of Dartmouth by the late Dr. John P. Martin.

Halifax first declared a half-holiday in August, the same day as the Dartmouth Natal Day, in 1906.

HRP MONITORING CONNAUGHT AVENUE SPEED




Regent Road area of Connaught Avenue

HALIFAX TRANSIT'S MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER PLAN (MFTP)

Approximately 26% of the total MFTP network has been implemented: a total of 20 routes. The resulting increase to ridership has been notable across the transit network. For example, an observed ridership increase of:

- 21% on routes impacted by the November 2017 MFTP service changes.
- 8% on routes impacted by the August 2018 MTFP service changes.
- Overall system-wide boardings increased more than 7% in 2018/19, and revenue ridership increased 4.8%.

More good news from the MFTP that will impact District 9:

Mumford Terminal:

This terminal is a key facility in the new network and is tentatively scheduled for replacement in 2020/21, with design work starting in 2019/20.





NON-ACCEPTED STREETS

On October 26, 2017, I put forward a motion at the Transportation Standing Committee requesting a staff report on cost estimates for providing the non-accepted streets in HRM with a comparable level of service, maintenance, and replacement along with options for "accepting" these streets; and, a recommendation on a way to proceed.

I am pleased to advise that on July 16th, Regional Council approved a motion to:

 Have staff prepare the capital budgets for the 2020/21 and 2021/2022 fiscal years to consider allocating funding for Phase 1 (title/boundary review of 42 non-accepted streets 2. If funding has been approved in the capital budget for Phase 1 (title/boundary review of 42 non-accepted streets), direct staff to undertake the title/boundary review of all 42 non-accepted streets listed on Appendix A of the April 11, 2019 revised staff report that are in Category 2 (5 non-accepted streets), Category 3 (9 non-accepted streets), Category 4 (28 non-accepted streets).

This means that pending capital budget approval, the non-accepted streets in District 9, as listed in the <u>staff report dated April 11, 2019</u>, will be considered for title/boundary review which is step 1 in consideration of providing comparable service to these streets. One of the non-accepted streets in District 9 under consideration is Boulderwood Drive which is classified as a Category 1 – single lane with

driveway appearance.

HERRING COVE ROAD FUNCTIONAL PLAN REVIEW

Many residents have been asking about repairs to Herring Cove Road such as the sidewalk project from Glenora Avenue to Civic #222 on Herring Cove Road. Although approved in the 2017/18 budget, this project has been on hold pending the completion of the Herring Cove Road Functional Plan which is expected to be presented to Council in late summer or early fall.

The Herring Cove Road Functional Plan is reviewing the entire stretch of road from the Armdale Roundabout to just past Lynnett Road (500 Block) and is divided into at least 8 sections with varying projects planned for each section. Improving traffic and pedestrian safety are top priorities for residents as learned from the public input during the SHAPE YOUR CITY online survey and open house that was held. Suggestions such as improvements to the intersection at Herring Cove Road and Purcells Cove Road and safer 500 block crosswalks/sidewalks/lighting were such some of the ideas put forward by residents.

I look forward to sharing more information with you when the Herring Cove Road Functional Plan comes to Regional Council. Stay tuned!




