

NORTH WEST COMMUNITY COUNCIL UPDATES

On May 10th, the North West Community Council (NWCC) held two public hearings on Cases 22703 and 21355. See details below:

<u>Case 22703: Amendments to</u> <u>Development Agreement for Lands on</u> <u>Walker Service Road, Lower Sackville</u>

Application by WM Fares Architects, on behalf of Cascade Property Group Limited, to amend an existing development agreement at 26 Walker Service Road, Lower Sackville to change from 1 multi-unit residential building with 52 units and 34 townhouse units on a new public street to two multi-unit residential buildings and two existing single-unit dwellings, for a total of 114 units on the site.



The proposal was to amend the Development Agreement to allow for two 4-storey residential apartment buildings, each containing approximately 56 dwelling units, in the center of the site and the retention of the two existing single unit dwellings. The public street was removed from the proposal.

Motion passed to approve the Development Agreement for Case 22703.

Case 21355: Development Agreement for a Residential Subdivision between Lively Road and Wilson Lake Drive, Middle Sackville

Armco Capital Inc. applied to enter into a new development agreement to allow subdivision of the lands between Lively Road and Wilson Lake



Drive, Middle Sackville for a residential development with a total of 167 residential units.

COVID-19



The major aspects of the proposal are:

- 107 single unit dwelling lots;
- 56 semi-detached dwelling units (28 lots);
- 4 additional units if the detailed survey of wetlands and watercourses permits;
- access from Wilson Lake Drive (entrance only) and Lively Road (two-way access);
- maintenance of a tree buffer between existing lots along Lively Road and Wilson Lake Drive and the proposed lots; and
- 1,789 square metres of parkland.

Traffic signal lights are being considered for Lively Road and Sackville Drive intersection once development is underway (approximately 2024 installation).

Motion passed to approve the Development Agreement for Case 21355.




An interactive parks and outdoor spaces map is

COMMUNITY GARDENS & NATURALIZED AREAS

While the <u>Public Gardens</u> are a renowned gem of our city, there are also opportunities to enjoy (or create) <u>community gardens</u> throughout other parts of the municipality.



Community gardens provide a shared opportunity for residents to grow food and produce floral or landscape displays.



Naturalized spaces, such as Sime Court in Hammonds Plains, are another option to provide stewardship over our natural environment. Naturalization is an ecologically based approach to landscape management that seeks to enhance biodiversity and ecological resilience in the urban landscape using native or non-invasive-adapted plant species including flowering perennials, grasses, shrubs, and trees.

On January 29, 2019, Halifax Regional Council provided direction to expand naturalization efforts in parks and right of ways and, on March 23, 2021, <u>approved a report</u> providing updates and requesting an extension of the current pilot projects.



Local residents initiated a naturalization project in a right-of-way area along <u>Sime Court in</u> <u>Kingswood</u>. A grassed area has been converted to a pollinator meadow using native and noninvasive-adapted plant species. Please contact <u>Penelope Kuhn</u>, HRM's Planner, Parks

SPCA NEWS



The TNR (Trap, Neuter, Return) program benefits the whole community. It improves the lives of feral cats, decreases the size of colonies over time, and eliminates neighbourhood nuisance.

HRM, in collaboration with Spay Day Halifax and the Nova Scotia SPCA, has been working to address these concerns over the last four years. This year, more than ever, we need your input in locating a cat colony in your area. You can email information directly to: <u>catcolony@spcans.ca</u> or call 902-468-7877.

Through TNR, young kittens and friendly cats are taken to SPCA shelters where they will be cared for until they're ready to find a forever home. Feral cats, or wild cats, are much different; what would cause your cuddly, pet cat to purr, would cause them stress. This is due to them having spent the majority of their lives outside with little or no human interaction. Feral cats are much happier continuing to live outside. They are therefore humanely trapped,

spayed/neutered, ear-tipped and returned to their local colony.

Due to TNR interventions, there are fewer feral cats in HRM. Neutering/spaying one stray or feral cat can prevent as many as 180 kittens from being born. The Nova Scotia SPCA vet team is specialized and equipped to do spays and neuters for all of HRM.

One of the colony caretakers reported: "Having our feral colony neutered has been amazing! We don't have to look at rounded tummies and wonder where, and when, the new litter would be. Rounded tummies are now just well-fed kitties. I can't stress enough the burden and stress lifted from our shoulders. We are so very grateful!"

Feral/stray cats impact the entire community and requires a community to help solve the problem. We are so thankful to the amazing team and volunteers who spend their evenings and weekends dedicated to TNR. As a direct result of their hard work, fewer kittens are born into harsh conditions where they would be at risk of food scarcity, disease and predators. Feral cats can live happy, healthy lives no longer in constant distress.
