COMMUNITY GRANTS

HRM's Community Grams Program offers funding for community projects led by registered, non-profit organizations and charities throughout the Halifax region. There are project grants of up to \$5,000 and capital grants of up to \$25,000.

While you cannot apply yet for 2022, you can contact the Grants office for general inquiries at this time: NonProfitGrants@halifax.ca. Applications will be accepted starting in January and up until March 31, 2022.

A wide variety of projects are eligible for the grants such as publishing maps or guidebooks, creating interpretive panels, buying safety equipment, or renovating a building for community use.

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EMERGENCY ACCOMODATIONS UPDATE



Updates are currently issued on a weekly basis to provide progress reports on efforts to establish emergency accommodations sites in Dartmouth and Halifax. These updates are part of HRM's ongoing efforts to ensure you are informed with the most up-to-date information.

These updates will be provided until modular units have been installed at both sites by the municipality and the Province of Nova Scotia has begun to place individuals at the sites and provide wrap around services. Depending upon the status of progress, frequency of updates may vary.

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HRM'S ONGOING COMMITMENT TO PUBLIC DATA ACCESS

As part of Halifax Regional Municipality's commitment to improving citizen engagement and enhancing transparency and accountability to its residents, the municipality is pleased to provide public access to its data. Open Data is a permanent service provided to citizens and businesses to access data free of charge.

The Municipality recently released five new datasets:

- Bike Amenities;
- Cityworks Service Requests;
- Cityworks Service Requests Custom Fields;
- Road Safety Countermeasures Tracking; and,
- Traffic Calming Infrastructure.

The addition of these five sets brings the total number of open data datasets to 165. Additionally, other datasets have been updated, including building permits from the new permitting & licensing application, construction permits from the new permitting & licensing application, and HRM Tax Rates – adding in new rates for 2021 (this dataset is updated annually).

A wide range of data can be sourced for free through the catalogue, including transit routes and schedule data, solid waste collection schedules, and area rates. New data releases occur several times throughout the year.

The Open Data initiative was launched in early 2014 to help improve resident engagement and enhance transparency on municipal data. The program was formalized by Regional Council later that year through the adoption of <u>Administrative Order 2014-006-ADM Respecting Open Data</u>.

REINSTATING BELLS TO HALIFAX CITY HALL

Real bells have been reinstalled at City Hall, and they are ringing! This is the first time that real bells have rang at City Hall in almost 100 years, after the original bell was damaged during the Halifax Explosion in 1917. Since 1995, it's been a recording of Westminster Abbey. Learn more about this project and check out some photos here.

The two bells, one quite possibly an original bell of City Hall, offer historical significance and a traditional sound experience to everyone in Halifax.





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MY ROAD HAS GOTTEN NARROWER-WHY?




Q: I've noticed some streets around the municipality are narrower than they once were. Why is this done?

A: Engineering improvements like street narrowing are part of the municipality's ongoing initiatives to improve road safety. Traffic calming helps make neighbourhoods safer for non-drivers:

- Curb extensions and/or raised medians narrow the road width. This reduces vehicle speeds by making the road feel more constrained, making it safer for people to walk, roll, and cycle in their community.
- Curb extensions, located at intersections, reduce the crossing distance for pedestrians and increase mutual visibility between pedestrians and motorists. These modified roadways are designed to have minimal impact on resident access, buses, emergency vehicles and maintenance vehicles, and are designed to accommodate turning movements for larger vehicles.

- I am aware that while these changes are intended to improve overall safety, cyclists can sometimes feel squeezed on these narrower sections. While these measures slow down motorists, I urge users of the road to respect each other and the rules of the road.
- While municipal staff work hard to notify and engage residents on these changes, it is possible that you may notice a newly narrowed road and were not sure why it was done. I hope this helps to explain why this work happens, and I always appreciate resident feedback as our community evolves.



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WINTER SAFETY TIPS FOR MOTORISTS

With winter weather arriving soon to our region, Halifax Regional Police is sharing some winter safety tips to help road users be winter ready.

Vehicle maintenance

 Plan ahead to ensure your vehicle is roadworthy. Check your safety inspection sticker and the tread on your tires. Keep a snowbrush or ice scraper in your vehicle and consider topping up your vehicle with extra windshield washer fluid. It's also a good idea to have a shovel and/or a bag of salt or sand in your vehicle in case you get stuck.

Driving safely for the road conditions

- Stay up to date with the weather conditions.
- Visibility is key. Before you hit the road, clear all snow from the roof, hood, license plate, windows, mirrors, lights, turn signals and cameras of your vehicle. Scrape/defrost your windshield if necessary.
- Be mindful that winter conditions create challenges for pedestrians who may need to walk in the roadway to avoid snow-covered or icy sidewalks.
- Never drive distracted. Keep your hands on the wheel and your eyes on the road. Watch for other road users, pedestrians, and cyclists.

Adjust your speed to the conditions.
Leave extra space between you and the
vehicle in front of you so that you can
safely slow down and/or stop. Remember
not to accelerate or brake too quickly
when the roads are slippery.

Parking

- Think before you park on the street. When and where you park in the winter can have a big impact on clearing streets and sidewalks, which, in turn, can affect road safety. In Nova Scotia, vehicles can be towed at any time during the day or night on any day of the year if they are interfering with snow clearing operations, as per Section 139 of the Nova Scotia Motor Vehicle Act. In addition, the municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect every year from Dec. 15 to March 31. It will be enforced only during declared weather events and ongoing clearing operations. When enforced, the parking ban is in effect from 1 a.m. until 6 a.m. throughout the Regional Centre of the municipality. To learn more, visit our website.
- To help make a responsible parking choice, ask yourself:
 - Is the overnight parking ban currently being enforced?
 - Is your vehicle causing a safety issue?
 - o Is it making the road impassable?
 - Is it impeding snow operations underway in the area?

If the answer to any of these questions is yes, do not park on the street.
