EMERA OVAL NOW OPEN

The Emera Oval is now open for the winter season, weather permitting.

The maximum capacity will be 230 participants, per skate time. Access will be provided on a first-come-first-serve basis until the maximum capacity has been reached.

Residents must show <u>full proof of COVID-19 vaccination</u> and government issued photo identification, practice physical distancing, as well as wear a mask at all times including on the ice and in the Oval Pavilion.

Equipment rentals, including skates and helmets, will not be available at this time, therefore, residents will be required to bring their own equipment. CSA-approved multi-impact hockey helmets are mandatory for children 12 years of age and under however, all skaters are encouraged to wear a helmet, for their own safety.

The Emera Oval is the largest artificial ice surface east of Quebec – approximately 55,000 square feet of ice, or the same as three NHL hockey rinks. The ice surface will be open for free daily public skates throughout the winter.

Residents are encouraged to check the website or hotline prior to heading out, as weather and ice conditions can result in closures or delays. View the latest information and schedule at halifax.ca/skateHRM.






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YOUR DARTMOUTH NORTH VIDEO DIRECTORY

ICE SAFETY

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that it is not currently safe to be on frozen lakes and ponds as there is noticeable thin ice and open water in many lakes across the region.

The municipality's ice thickness testing program has not begun for the 2021/22 winter season as it is not yet safe for staff to be on the ice. Each year the municipality provides weekly reports on ice thickness testing undertaken on more than 70 lakes throughout the region. This testing will resume when conditions allow.

Residents are asked to take safety precautions for themselves and their families by avoiding any recreation activities on frozen lakes and ponds, including walking, ice fishing, snowmobiling, and skating until ice thickness testing resumes. The Canadian Red Cross recommends that ice be at least 15 centimeters thick for individual skating, and at least 20 centimeters thick for group skating. Extreme caution is advised in areas where streams flow into and out of lakes. It is also important to note that ice conditions may vary over the entire surface of lakes and are subject to change with weather conditions.

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SNOW CLEARING IN HRM

Winter weather brings some extra challenges to us all and it can be frustrating as we wait at home for our street or sidewalk to be cleared. However, HRM has service standards for streets, sidewalks, and bus stops and the timing varies depending on the priority level.

We prioritize commonly used streets, bus routes and roads that provide access to hospitals and schools. When the snow stops, operators work as quickly and safely to have all the roads cleared by 24 hours and major roads and bus routes within 12 hours.

You can identify when you street may get cleared **after a snow event has stopped**:

If your street or sidewalk has not been cleared by the indicated time in each chart, please ContactUs@311.halifax.ca or call 311 so crews can be dispatched to address the issue. If an emergency vehicle needs to access a street, staff dispatch a plow immediately to that street.

Residents should note that in snowfalls greater than 30 centimeters or in blizzard conditions, more time may be needed to complete clearing. The same exception may

apply when there are rapidly changing weather conditions. Crews will continue working until all streets and sidewalks are clear and safe.

There are two types of grants: a project grant of up to \$5,000 and a capital grant of up to \$25,000. ROAD NARROWING FOR SAFETY



Q: I've noticed some streets around the municipality are narrower than they once were. Why is this done?

A: Engineering improvements like street narrowing are part of the municipality's ongoing initiatives to improve road safety. Traffic calming helps make neighbourhoods safer for non-drivers.

- Curb extensions and/or raised medians narrow the road width. This reduces vehicle speeds by making the road feel more constrained.
- Curb extensions, located at intersections, reduce the crossing distance for pedestrians and increase mutual visibility between pedestrians and motorists. These modified roadways are designed to have minimal impact on resident access, buses, emergency vehicles and maintenance vehicles, and are designed to





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accommodate turning movements for larger vehicles.

 I am aware that while these changes are intended to improve overall safety, cyclists can sometimes feel squeezed on these narrower sections. While these measures slow down motorists, I urge users of the road to respect each other - and the rules of the road.

Previously, the municipality provided a variety of information for newcomers on Halifax.ca, including details on assistance for refugees, transportation, education, health and safety, employment, income and taxes, and much more. *New in Halifax* is now the centralized hub for this type of information, so it's all readily available in one place.

The website is part of the Halifax Immigration

Partnership (HIP) initiative, which was established in
2013 by the community partners including the Halifax
Regional Municipality and is funded by Immigration,
Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). HIP works with
partners from many different sectors to ensure that
Halifax is a welcoming place for all newcomers to live
and thrive, a place in which all belong and can call home.

Local Immigration Partnerships (LIPs) strengthen the community's ability to welcome newcomers into a place that values and embraces diversity. Today, there are more than 70 LIPs across the country.

New in Halifax will offer the ability for service providers in the HIP network to share information, resources and best practices with each other to further expand offerings to newcomers in Canada.
