
MARCH IS FRANCOPHONIE MONTH

Nova Scotia's own Acadian history is very complex. Despite many great difficulties over the years, including the tragic deportation in the 1700s, Acadian people returned and established strong communities with a very vibrant culture that remains an integral part of Nova Scotia's diversity to this day.

Our Francophone culture also connects us with the world in terms of international relations. Did you know that Canada is a part of an organization called "La Francophonie", a group of 88 states, member governments, and observers – including 300 million Francophones – that share French as a common language and common value system in many ways.

APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR DISTRICT BOUNDARY RESIDENT REVIEW PANEL POSITIONS

A district boundary review is required in 2022; changes coming from this review will not come into effect until the 2024 Municipal Election.

However, residents now can apply to join the Boundary Resident Review Panel. The Panel will serve as a key component for the 2022 <u>District Boundary Review process</u>.

The 2022 District Boundary Review process includes:

- ✓ Phase 1, which will determine the size of Council and its governance structure; and,
- ✓ Phase 2, which will set specific district boundaries.

The District Boundary Resident Review Panel, supported by municipal staff, will begin their work in Phase 2. The Panel will consider how to draw boundaries of municipal districts, based on the recommendations from Phase 1.

It is recommended that applicants have professional expertise in the field of urban planning, municipal governance, public policy and/or political science.

Applications are due by Monday, March 7, 2022.

This year, tax clinics will be held via telephone with a volunteer from CRA's Community Volunteer Income Tax Program.


You may be eligible for help at a free tax clinic if you have a modest income and a simple tax situation.

Any resident may call 311 to request street tree work within the municipal service boundary. For more information, visit our website.




Impaired Driving Statistics

 In December 2021, 41 drivers were charged with impaired-related offences.

 36 were alcohol-related, 5 were drug-related.



 Police received 16 calls in December from citizens who suspected impaired drivers.

Call 911 immediately. Give the call taker your location, a description of the vehicle, including the license plate number, colour, make and model, the direction of travel for the vehicle and a description of the driver.

POTHOLES – REPORTING AND REPAIRING

Another freeze-thaw cycle = more potholes!
This is a challenging year for potholes due to the freeze and thaw cycle we've been experiencing. I get many questions and concerns from residents as we move from winter into spring, as new potholes appear, and existing ones may get bigger.

HRM crews monitor for potholes on our roads year-round, but it's also important for residents important to report potholes so that crews are aware of them and can work on getting them fixed.

Q: How do I report potholes?

A: On municipal roads, **please call 311** or email <u>contactus@311.halifax.ca</u>. You can also fill out this online form here.

However, even within the municipality the province is responsible for 100-series highways (and ramps/overpasses associated with these highways). On provincially owned roads, please contact the TIR Operations Contact Centre (OCC): tir-occ@novascotia.ca or call 1-844-696-7737

Q: What if my vehicle is damaged by a pothole?

A: The driver should first call 311 to determine who is responsible for the stretch of road the pothole is located on. If the damage occurred due to a pothole on a municipal road, begin a claim process with a 311 agent. If you determine it occurred on a provincial road, please contact TIR.

Q: How long will it take to repair potholes?

A: The time to fix a pothole can range anywhere from 7 business days to 30 days depending on the pothole and if it is considered a priority. Crews aim to repair priority potholes on main arterial roads within 7 business days. However, weather can hamper these efforts - due to recent weather, crews were unable to fill potholes for nearly 10 days recently, off and on.

Q: What constitutes a priority pothole?

A: The municipality considers a pothole of 8 cm or greater in depth to be a P1 (Priority 1), and a pothole of 7.9 cm or less in depth to be a P2 (Priority 2).

- P1 classified potholes have a service standard of seven business days on arterial and major collector roads, 14 business days on minor collector roads and 30 business days on local roads.
- P2 classified potholes have a 12-month service standard on all street classifications.

Q: How are potholes repaired at different times of year?

A: HRM has two strategies for repairing potholes:

- Cold patch: a quick and low-cost strategy, where a pre-mix of asphalt is placed in the potholes and compacted. These relatively quick repairs are generally performed during winter months and are mainly a as a temporary hold until proper repairs can be scheduled.
- Hot mix repair: Pavement around the pothole is saw-cut and then filled with hot-mix asphalt. This type of repair generally addresses the underlying problems; however, the initial cost is higher, and the repair process is more involved. Plants typically don't open until May for hot asphalt.

Q: How many potholes does HRM repair?

A: To provide some perspective - municipal transportation crews have repaired more than 600 potholes across the municipality since November.

There are approximately 384 on HRM's rolling repair list. It's important to note these numbers are constantly changing, as crews log and repair potholes each day.
