DISTRICT 16 RESIDENTS.

Another busy and challenging year has passed. I hope that you are well, as we look forward to a safe and enjoyable summer. As you will see on the back page, **Bedford Days** will be held in person. The volunteer committee and HRM

staff are working hard to plan fun events for all ages and interests. I hope to see you there! Those of you who follow me on Facebook or Twitter, or subscribe to my periodic email updates, will know that I share regular updates on events, budget discussions, projects, and infrastructure improvements or repairs. I will attempt to also accomplish this for you all within the limited space of this newsletter.

Design planning is ongoing for the **Bedford Ferry Service**. The approved HRM capital plan includes a new library and some community space at the terminal location. The project will require provincial and federal funding assistance, but to-date, all indications suggest their support. The almost-completed ferry and terminal design plan was funded by all orders of government.

Several streets in our community received **traffic calming** measures over the past year or two. This will continue with speed humps being placed on side streets and speed tables on main streets. HRM's traffic calming program began in 2017 to address your concerns. HRM Public Works and HRM Parks capital project information for District 16, plus overviews of significant regional projects, are highlighted in this newsletter.

Many of you will have heard that the provincial government has identified nine special planning areas for expedited development to address our housing shortage. This includes **Sandy Lake in Bedford**. While HRM did not believe

the fun begins on June 21st!

development of this area was needed for over a decade, the province and developers feel it is required now in order to help accommodate growth. While HRM will no longer be the final decision maker on this development, all indications are that the provincial task force will be respectful of HRM's planning policies, processes and studies. This includes our desire to significantly expand Sandy Lake Park. Significant improvements and upgrades will be required to the Hammonds Plains Road and to transit to address additional traffic. The developers will continue to be required to share the cost of these improvements.

Affordable and social housing are issues facing many residents. Since 1996, housing has been a provincial responsibility. However, HRM is now partnering with the Province and service providers to address homelessness and social housing in our municipality. This includes initiatives such as paying for hotel rooms and constructing modular housing units.

HRM recently received approval from the province to implement "inclusionary zoning" to permit HRM to legislate that a portion of affordable units be built in many private developments. To assist with the need for **affordable housing**, Regional Council has undertaken the following actions: participation in the federal Rapid Housing program, establishment of a grant program, waiving municipal construction fees, multi-year tax relief for non-profit groups, a surplus municipal land program, and bylaw reform to permit secondary and backyard suites.

COGSWELL DISTRICT PROJECT UPDATES

The Cogswell District project is the biggest city-building project in the history of Halifax. This new neighbourhood district is now under construction, and will be a place for people to live, work, and play. Where the Cogswell Interchange now stands, we can look forward to a


connection between downtown with the north end and waterfront. The completion of the Cogswell District project is expected to cost about \$122.6M with expected completion by Fall 2025. This project has the potential to be primarily self-funded in the long term; the sale of land, utility cost sharing, and the subsequent property taxes will help off-set the front-end investment and generate long-term recurring revenue for the municipality. HALIFACT: OUR LONG-TERM CLIMATE ACTION PLAN

In 2020, Halifax Regional Council unanimously adopted HalifACT – a transformational plan to achieve a net-zero economy by 2050. HalifACT is one of the most ambitious climate action movements in Canada. It's our community response to the climate crisis that will build a more resilient and healthy future while preparing for current and future climate impacts. The Climate Action Tax will fund HalifACT projects such as electric vehicles and buses, net-zero buildings, installing public electric vehicle chargers, and taking actions to improve the resiliency of communities and infrastructure against the impacts of climate change – which range from flood mitigation and stormwater management to food security and emergency preparedness. WEST BEDFORD PICKLEBALL COURT AND OTHER PARKS UPDATES

The new regional pickleball court in West Bedford is now open, with thanks to HRM Parks & Recreation and Clayton Developments.

Plans are also in the works for two new tennis courts and a pump track in the West Bedford area. Other parks projects approved for 2022 include playgrounds for Teachery Park, Scott Saunders Memorial Park, Sunnyside Elementary School Park, and a court for Nicholas Meaghers Park. Further, a walkway will be constructed at the Lebrun Memorial Centre Park on Doyle Court.

SECONDARY & BACKYARD SUITES

Secondary and Backvard Suites can be used by aging parents or adult children or can be used as rental units. Regional Council approved Backyard Suites in 2020, and the rules apply mostly everywhere in the HRM for singledetached houses, duplexes or semi-detached houses, and townhouses/rowhouses.

- Backyard Suites are separate free-standing buildings, either built overtop an accessory structure like a garage, or simply on their own (i.e., granny suites, carriage flats or tiny homes).
- **Secondary Suites** are separate dwelling units that are completely contained within a home (i.e., in-law suites or basement apartments).

You can get permission to install or construct a secondary or backyard suite by applying for and obtaining a permit through HRM. Visit www.halifax.ca and search for "Permits" to easily access the permitting webpage, learn more about the specific requirements for each installation, and start your application process online.

You can also **call 311** and submit a service request if you would like to have a Planner contact you directly to help you get started.
