
PARKING TICKET FORGIVENESS PROGRAM



We are pleased to launch the <u>Parking Ticket</u> <u>Forgiveness Program</u>. Regional Council approved this initiative as part of the COVID Business Recovery package considered during the Balance Adjustment debate. From June 1st – September 31st residents or visitors that receive a paid parking

violation can submit their ticket along with a \$35+ receipt from a local business and have the ticket reversed.

READY TO BUILD A SECONDARY OR BACKYARD SUITE?



Are you considering adding a Secondary or Backyard suite to your property? These can be used by aging parents or adult children or as rental units for the general public.

Regional Council approved Backyard Suites in 2020. The new rules apply mostly everywhere in the Halifax Regional Municipality for single-detached houses, duplexes or semi-detached houses, and townhouses/rowhouses.

Determine your desired type of installation:

Backyard Suites are separate free-standing buildings, either built overtop an accessory structure like a garage, or simply on their own (i.e., granny suites, carriage flats or tiny homes). A Backyard Suite must satisfy all Building and Plumbing Code requirements as they apply to a residential dwelling. There will also be a lot coverage restriction that will determine how large the structure can be, applied by the local Land Use By-law (determined through the permit application process or by submitting a request for information through 311).





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Secondary Suites are separate dwelling units that are completely contained within a home (i.e., in-law suites or basement apartments). The total floor area of all storeys of a Secondary Suite cannot be more than 80% of the total floor area of all storeys of the Main Suite, excluding the garage and any common spaces that serve both suites, or 80 m² (861 ft²), whichever is the lesser.

Apply for a Permit:

You can get permission to install or construct a secondary or backyard suite by applying for and obtaining a permit through HRM. Visit our website to learn more about applying for either a Secondary Suite or a Backyard Suite (and the various requirements for each), and to start your permit application process online.

You can also call 311 and submit a service request if you would like to have a Planner contact you directly to help you get started. This website provides step-by-step information on the permit application process.

Other considerations:


It is important to review and follow other requirements that may be involved in addition to obtaining a permit as applicable:

Building Code and Regulatory Information: Here are other important steps involved in completing your new construction (as applicable to your property):

- Well/Septic tie-in or construction (NS Environment): Contact 902-424-7773
 The National Building Code will require confirmation that either tie-in to an existing septic, or a new septic system has been reviewed and accepted by NS Environment.

2022 MUNICIPAL DISTRICT BOUNDARY REVIEW UPDATES



This year HRM is required to review population changes and the size of its 16 districts. Depending on the outcome of this District Boundary Review, our district could possibly look different by the next municipal election in 2024. The number of districts (and therefore number of HRM councillors) could also change.

District Boundary Reviews happen every 8 years in Nova Scotia and are a time for municipalities to confirm that their governance structure and polling districts are providing the necessary services to the community. The review happens in several phases.

Phase 1 of the boundary review was to examine the Council governance structure and provide rationale for the number of councillors and polling districts. The report found that 16 councillors/polling districts was suitable for the needs of the municipality. Regional Council will consider this report and recommendation from Executive Standing Committee on June 14th.





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Recommendations for the new boundaries will be made later this year by the District Boundary Resident Review Panel, an independent volunteer advisory group of citizens. The Resident Review Panel members are now leading Phase 2 of the review on behalf of Regional Council and will examine the distribution of polling districts within the HRM and considering the number of electors, relative parity of voting power, population density, communities of interest and geographic size.

Public engagement for Phase 2 is planned for September 2022.

The District Boundary Resident Review Panel will submit its final report and recommendation on Phase 2 of the District Boundary Review study to the Executive Standing Committee in November. In December, Regional Council will review the report and recommendation on Phase 2 from Executive Standing Committee and the final Boundary Review application will be submitted by Regional Council to the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board by December 31st, 2022.

KEEP RODENTS AT BAY WITH THESE TIPS



Rats, mice, and other pests... oh my! I have heard from some residents this year about rodent sightings. Staff with HRM's Property, Fleet & Environment business unit plan to submit a report for Council's consideration in the coming weeks on an Integrated Pest Management Plan that focuses on more public education on rodent control.

While the municipality has not specifically received an increase in rat complaints this year, it is important to be aware of how to prevent rodent infestations and what to do if you spot one.

Residents can call 311 to report a live or deceased rat in a municipal park, or a deceased rat in the right-of-way. However, if spotted within your property or residence, it is advisable to tackle the problem of occasional invaders right away to avoid a severe infestation, according to Health Canada.

Prevention is key. This involves rodent-proofing your home, starting with taking a thorough look around the outside – and inside – of your home to look for potential entry points.

It is important to ask yourself: "is there anything they can eat here? Is there anywhere they can live?" Start with removing food sources (such as pet food left outside, or garbage) and reducing habitat, including moving woodpiles away from the home, cutting long grass, and sealing any holes or cracks you may observe on the outside of your home.

Proper waste disposal plays a significant role in attracting – or ideally, deterring – rodents. Improperly placed solid waste that may create a food source for rodents. Households and businesses can play a role in mitigating rodent infestations by reducing nuisance relating to green bins:

- Place wet food waste in box-board (like a cereal box), or wrap using one sheet of newspaper
- Line your mini-bin and green cart with a paper bag
- Empty your mini-bin daily and place the green cart for collection even if isn't full
- Food waste can be stored in the freezer until collection day
- Store the green cart in a ventilated, shady location
- Ensure that your green bin lid stays closed. If you choose to use a bungee cord, be sure to remove it at the curb on collection day





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- Report broken carts or missing pieces (for example grate/vent) by calling 311
- In the kitchen, catch fruit flies with a bowl of vinegar covered with plastic wrap with several small holes in it
