NWCC UPDATE



The October 3rd meeting of the North West Community Council (NWCC) dealt with Case 21460: Amendment to the Municipal Planning Strategy for Planning Districts 14 & 17 and a Development Agreement for Opportunity Site C off Ingram Drive, Fall River.

NWCC defeated a Notice of Motion to consider the proposed Development Agreement. This decision has been appealed to the <u>Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board.</u>

The proposed amendment to the Municipal Planning Strategy (MPS) to remove the requirement for direct road access from Ingram Drive to Cobequid Road is scheduled for a joint public hearing with Regional Council on November 8th.

RCMP ROAD SAFETY STATS SEPTEMBER





OFF HIGHWAY VEHICLE (OHV & ATV)



Sadly, RCMP officers across the province have been attending an increasing number of all-terrain vehicle (ATV) collisions. "Every year, the RCMP responds to numerous fatal and serious injury collisions involving ATVs," says

Staff Sergeant Ben Parry of the Nova Scotia RCMP's Traffic Services Unit. "However, we're hearing from various detachments across the province that over the past few years, hardly a weekend goes by without a call to an ATV incident."

Provincial government statistics show that there's been an 18% increase in off-highway vehicle (OHV) registrations between 2020 and 2021. There are approximately 50,000 registered OHVs in the province.

"The data shows there are three main causes of major OHV events: impaired driving, speed, distracted operation of the vehicle, or a combination of all three," says Staff Sergeant Parry. "Improper use of protective equipment, or not using it at all, is another risk."

The exact number of OHV collisions is unknown. Those that occur on private properties and trails are likely to be under-reported due to how the Motor Vehicle Act defines mandatory collision reporting; it applies to public roadways only.

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"We want Nova Scotians of all ages who choose to ride OHVs to be safe and responsible," said Public Works Minister Kim Masland. "A reminder to OHV users to wear a helmet, observe speed limits when using the trails, and keep a safe distance between you and other trail users."

"When you get on an off-road vehicle, safety needs to be your number one priority," says Staff Sergeant Parry. "Otherwise, your life – and the lives of others – is at risk. Ride sober. Don't speed. Pay attention. Operate the machine according to your skill level. And wear safety gear, including a proper helmet."

Staff Sergeant Parry also encourages OHV users to understand and obey the laws governing OHV use.

"Those who violate the Off-Highway Vehicles Act could face a penalty of \$200-\$2,000 for a first offence and have their vehicle seized. And if found to be impaired, they can be charged under the Criminal Code."

If those 16 and under are found to be operating OHVs out of compliance with the Off-Highway Vehicles Act or the Motor Vehicle Act, parents or guardians are responsible.

"Fall is a beautiful time of the year to explore Nova Scotia," says Staff Sergeant Parry. "While OHV operators are encouraged to have fun while enjoying the outdoors, our message is to ride safely – for their sake and the sake of others."

NOVA SCOTIA OFF ROAD RIDERS' ASSOCIATION



The Nova Scotia Off Road Riders Association (NSORRA) have just finished the Split Pine Bridge, farther north on the Old Truro Road, 600 metres in from the end of Grant Road in Enfield. Like the Ledwidge Bridge, the Split Pine Bridge is multi-use and suitable for hikers, mountain bikers, ATVs, horses, dirt bikes, snowmobiles and all but the largest side by sides.

This bridge was built to protect an unnamed stream that crosses the road and to make a more comfortable crossing of the stream for most user groups. We have named it after the very unusual pine tree not far from the bridge.

LOCAL MI'KMAQ ARTIST -LORETTA GOULD



Beautiful images depicting Mi'kmaq culture and traditions created by local Mi'kmaq artist, Loretta Gould, are now on display for all to enjoy at Halifax Stanfield.

In recognition of Mi'kmaq History Month in October, a new, permanent display featuring twenty-four of Gould's original artwork designs was installed at the airport. The artwork, located on windows throughout the airport check-in hall, features images of a traditional birchbark canoe, fishing, and spiritual ceremonies, to name a few.

The display reminds everyone that we are in Mi'kma'ki, the ancestral and unceded land of the Mi'kmaq people, by showcasing traditional Mi'kmaq art.

"I've always had art in my life; when I grew up, I wanted to be a fashion designer," said Gould, reflecting on how she became an artist. "I started with quilting but then I was drawn to painting instead at the Friends United Art Gallery. That was 12 years ago and the pieces you see at the airport were all created over time. My hope is that people coming in and out of the airport have the same feeling seeing my work that I had when I created it – I hope it makes them happy."

The semi-transparent material used to display the artwork allows the sun to shine through, and in the afternoon, the artwork creates colourful reflections throughout the check-in hall.

Gould's natural talent and passion for sharing Mi'kmaq culture through her art also shines through as she reflects on today's unveiling of her art for the world. "Seeing my art come to life in this way brings me a lot of joy."

"This airport is located on the ancestral and unceded lands of the Mi'kmaq people, and as such, it is our duty to honour the stewards of these lands who were here for generations before us," said

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Joyce Carter, President & CEO, Halifax International Airport Authority (HIAA). "As a key gateway for the region, our airport often makes a first impression for visitors and travellers. We want to make sure that impression reflects the diverse communities we serve."

HIAA is committed to reconciliation and has been taking steps to be a better ally to Indigenous communities and partners. HIAA will continue to showcase Mi'kmaq art, history, and culture at the airport, through ongoing collaboration with the 2023 North American Indigenous Games, Mi'kmaq community members and other partners.

MUNICIPAL BUDGET 2023/24

The <u>Strategic Multi-Year Business Planning and Budget Process and 2023/24 Budget Outlook</u> report, presented to Halifax Regional Council on October 25th, marks the start of the 2023/24 Budget and Business Planning process. This report provides a high-level overview of the background, changes and updates, key dates and milestones, financial challenges and budget implications.

The commencement of the strategic planning process begins with the adoption of, or changes to, the multi-year strategic business planning and budget process, as well as the approval of the business planning and budget schedule.

On December 1st, 2020 Regional Council's Budget Committee approved the 2021-2025 Strategic Planning Framework and directed the Chief Administrative Officer to develop discrete plans (Council and Administrative) in accordance with this Framework.

On January 12th, 2021, Regional Council's Budget Committee approved the 2021-2025 Strategic Priorities Plan. This plan remains in place over the duration of the mandate of Regional Council but is reaffirmed annually.

On October 26th, 2021, Regional Council's Budget Committee approved the creation of an annual report that provides an update on progress toward the commitments in the Strategic Priorities Plan. This report, named the *Strategic Performance Report*, will be provided to Council each year in October or November, and will include highlights, accomplishments, and




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performance results associated with the previous year. A 2021/22 *Strategic Performance Report* will be presented on Tuesday, November 22, 2022.

SENIOR SNOW REMOVAL PROGRAM



There's no denying it – winter is on its way. There is a snow removal program available for seniors (ages 65 and older) and persons with disabilities to help ensure safe access to your home.

The Senior Snow Removal is a YMCA program provided in partnership with Halifax Regional Municipality, and oversees the clearing of front and back steps, walkways, ramps, and access to fuel tanks. Please note that the program does not include driveway clearing.

Those 65+ or persons with disabilities must also meet the following eligibility criteria:

- must reside in a single dwelling home which is owned or rented.
- must not exceed a total gross household income of \$32,000, and
- may not be a landlord.

The Senior Snow Removal operates on a first-come, first-serve basis. When maximum capacity is reached, the program will come to a close and individuals will be placed on a waitlist.

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

MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT PARK CONCEPT PLAN



Based on engagement results, HRM Parks & Recreation staff created the concept plan as shown above. Funding will be recommended for approval in a future capital budget.

A concept plan uses generic graphics to demonstrate where features will be located on site. The specific design of these features is determined when a contract is awarded to a proponent to complete the work.

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The concept plan includes a swing set, playground equipment for those aged 2-5 and 5-12 years old, a spray feature, an open lawn to be used as a play field, various seating options, shade trees, shrubs for privacy from neighbouring properties, rail fence to protect park users from the road, a light feature, waste receptacles, bike rack, a potential path connecting the park to the existing Cornerstone Park, and a driveway for maintenance vehicles.

GREEN CART TIPS FOR WINTER



HRM's Solid Waste Resources recently shared some helpful tips for dealing with green carts in

winter.

When temperatures drop, materials in green carts can freeze and cause issues for both residents and waste haulers. To avoid some of the problems associated with green carts in the winter, they suggest some of these helpful tips:

 Line the bottom of the green cart with newspaper or boxboard, like a cereal box



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- or yard waste bag, and line your mini-bin and green cart with a paper bag
- Food waste can be stored in the freezer until collection day, then deposited in your green cart just before collection
- Place your green cart in an area where the sun can reach it, if possible (to avoid freezing!)
- Wrap food scraps in newspaper, boxboard, or a paper bag
- Put out your green cart to the curb for every collection, even if the cart is not full.

- coached Team Canada at four Olympic Games, 2000, 2004, 2008, 2012.
- Canada's longest serving national woman's kayak coach spanning 13 Senior World Championship seasons.

- coached Canadian athletes to 11 Olympic medals and more than 100 medals at World Cup competitions.
- In 2012, he was Sport Nova Scotia Ricoh Coach of the Year.


