2023/24 MUNICIPAL BUDGET

The municipality runs on an April 1st – March 31st fiscal year so we are starting the process of setting our 2023/2024 municipal budget. Regional Council have already reviewed the 2023/24 budget direction report, with recommendations for tax and non-tax revenues to accommodate changing operational costs, capital investments, as well as debt and reserve changes.

Next month, we will begin reviewing each departments proposed budgets at a series of Council meetings between January – March 2023:

The public are welcome to participate and provide feedback in these meetings by speaking to council during the public participation section of the meeting or [submitting correspondence](#) to the Clerk’s Office.

The municipality is currently facing many pressures that have been unprecedented in recent history. As directed by the CAO, business units have spent several months scrutinizing their budgets. Through that exercise, the municipality has identified \$20 million in savings through a number of efforts which include, but are not limited to, asking business units to find a collective \$7 million in cuts and removing the proposed sidewalk funding increase. During the Budget Direction Report meeting, I made a motion to aim for a 4.0 per cent increase to the average residential and commercial property tax bill rather than the originally proposed 9.0 per cent. As we review each department’s budget we will be looking for opportunities to save while maintaining the essential services that make our municipality a great place to live, work and play! DARTMOUTH ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION SURVEY


The Halifax Regional Municipality are collecting feedback on active transportation planning for streets in the east Dartmouth area.

STUDENT TRANSIT PASS PILOT PROGRAM EXPANSION

The Student Transit Pass Pilot Program has been extended to December 31st and expanded to include six junior high schools for 2023.

The following schools will be included in the program as of January 1, 2023:

- Dartmouth High School
- Bicentennial School
- Dartmouth South Academy
- John Martin Junior High
- Woodlawn High School
- Caledonia Junior High
- Ellenvale Junior High
- Eric Graves Memorial Junior High
- École secondaire du Sommet
- École secondaire Mosaïque

This pilot program, offered in collaboration with the Halifax Regional Centre for Education (HRCE) and the Conseil scolaire acadien provincial (CSAP) gives free annual transit passes to students, providing access to conventional buses, Access-A-Bus, and ferries.

Halifax Transit will review the extended program in fall 2023 and provide recommendations to Regional Council on next steps for the program.

DISTRICT BOUNDARY REVIEW

The Halifax Regional Municipality is inviting residents to review the proposed district boundaries as part of the [2022 District Boundary Review process](#).

The District Boundary Review process will review the number of councillors and the boundaries for each polling district. Changes made from the Review's recommendations will be in place for the 2024 municipal election.

The process consists of two phases:

- **Phase 1**, which determined the size of Council and its governance structure; and,
- **Phase 2**, which set specific district boundaries.

The Phase 1 report was approved by Regional Council's Executive Committee on [May 30, 2022](#), and the Phase 2 *What We Heard* report and proposed district boundaries maps are now available on our [website](#).

You can see the new proposed District 6 boundaries [here](#). The Executive Standing Committee will advance recommended map options to Regional Council this month, and final recommendations will be submitted to the [Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board](#) for review.

SOBERING CENTRE PILOT PROJECT

Funding for a three-year sobering centre pilot has been approved.

Over the past two years, research and consultation was completed to assess the municipality's current approach to public intoxication within the region, with evidence consistently demonstrating the benefits of a harm reduction approach to substance misuse, especially for those who are experiencing addictions, mental health, or homelessness.

On April 12th, an information report was presented to Regional Council to establish a sobering centre, a place in which intoxicated individuals, whose intoxication poses a potential risk to themselves or others, can become sober in a monitored environment. The sobering centre has three main goals: connecting intoxicated individuals to appropriate services, reducing pressures on emergency response services, and avoiding criminalization for behaviours related to substance abuse, mental health and addictions. A cost-sharing agreement with the provincial government and other stakeholders to develop a viable, co-funded model was identified as a next step.

Provincial partners at the Nova Scotia Department of Health and Wellness and the Office of Addictions and Mental Health have indicated willingness to move forward with the municipality to implement a three-year sobering centre pilot commencing in 2023/24. To advance this work, Regional Council has approved the implementation of the three-year pilot, as well as funding until 2024/25 for a shared cost approach for the pilot, pending both municipal and provincial budget approvals. As a next step, pending funding approvals, staff, in consultation with provincial partners, will commence the process to select a service provider to develop and operate the centre, identify wrap around supports, and determine a location for the centre. HALIFAX WATER DITCH MAINTENANCE

Please note, Halifax Water is not responsible for the cosmetic grooming of ditches. Their mandate is to keep our pipes and drainage systems operating as they were intended. As a result, Halifax Water is solely focused on ensuring the flow of storm water by clearing blockages caused by soil and vegetation.

The municipality is responsible for vegetation in a ditch if it obstructs the right of way, or if it causes a visibility issue within the right of way.

SNOW CLEARING

With each weather event, snow clearing crews are responsible for approximately 3,844 lane kilometres of streets and about 1,000 kilometres of sidewalks!

HRM has service standards for streets, sidewalks, and bus stops and the timing varies depending on the priority level. We prioritize commonly used streets, bus routes and roads that provide access to hospitals and schools. When the snow stops, operators work as quickly and safely to have all the roads cleared by 24 hours following the storm and major roads and bus routes within 12 hours. Before contacting 311 about snow clearing, please ensure the service timelines for your area have expired. You can find detailed information about snow clearing service timelines on the interactive map or in the "when should clearing be complete?" section on the [website](#).

If your street or sidewalk has not been cleared by the indicated time in each chart, please [e-mail](#) or call 311 so crews can be dispatched to address the issue. If an emergency vehicle needs to access a street, staff dispatch a plow immediately to that street.

Snowfalls greater than 30 centimeters or in blizzard conditions, more time may be needed to complete clearing. The same exception may apply when there are rapidly changing weather conditions.

Crews will continue working until all streets and sidewalks are clear and safe.

The municipal overnight winter parking ban is in effect from December 15th to March 31st. The ban is enforced from 1:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. during declared weather events and snow removal operations only. STRATEGIC ROAD SAFETY PLAN

In 2021, there were 5,031 collisions within the Right-of-Way. While there were 739 fatal/injury collisions, there has been a 13.2% reduction in fatal/injury collisions from the 2018/2019 baseline data. Our short-term target is a 20% reduction in fatal/injury collisions from the baseline numbers by 2023.

In the past year, HRM has been involved with road safety projects including intersection safety reviews and video analytics studies, speed display signs, new RA-5 crosswalks and a review of pedestrian crossing gaps, a photo enforcement feasibility report, updated municipal design guidelines, engineering countermeasures (e.g., protected bike lanes, curb extensions, traffic calming, etc.), more enforcement and enhanced public communications.

New projects are coming next year, including a high-visibility (zebra) crosswalks pilot project, left-turn calming pilot project, speed cushions, action plans for intersections with the highest number of collisions, and more. Visit [our website](#) for more.

HALIFAX TRANSIT SCHEDULE/ROUTE CHANGES

A Halifax Transit service change took place last month as part of the [Moving Forward Together Plan](#) – Halifax Transit’s long-term plan to better align the transit network with the needs of Halifax residents now and into the future.

The following new route has been implemented:

- **Route 50 Dockyard-Shipyard** – [This route](#) will follow similar routing and levels of service as the former Route 11 Dockyard, traveling from the Bridge Terminal in Dartmouth to HMC Dockyard in Halifax, but will extend to provide a new connection to Halifax Shipyard.

As [previously announced](#) due to current staffing shortages, several bus trips are cancelled until further notice. Please note that starting Monday, November 21, some previously cancelled bus trips have returned to service while other routes have newly cancelled trips. These cancellations are done to provide more certainty to passengers and allow them to plan their trip. A full list of cancelled trips can be found on our [website](#).

Halifax Transit is currently running a Bus Operator recruitment campaign to increase staffing resources and resume regular operations as soon as possible. For more information, [visit our website](#).

CONSTRUCTION NOISE EXEMPTION PROCESS

The Halifax Regional Municipality is launching a construction noise exemption process to better regulate developers who need to extend construction noise beyond the standard [By-law N-200 Respecting Noise](#) timeframe (7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on weekdays), to finish construction and shorten project timelines.

This new exemption process follows the August 2022 Regional Council updates of section six of [By-law N-200 Respecting Noise](#).

The construction noise exemption process establishes criteria that a developer must meet, as well as a submission process to be reviewed by municipal staff. Further information can be found [online](#).

HRM AWARD FOR ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION AND TRANSPARENCY

SCAM TARGETING SENIORS

The RCMP/HRP Integrated Criminal Investigation Division is warning the public about numerous scams targeting seniors. With these scams, victims are contacted by fraudsters pretending to be a relative in need of money; often, the story is that the family member has been arrested and requires bail. The call is then usually taken over by another person pretending to be in a position of authority, such as a police officer or a lawyer, instructing the victim to provide this bail. The fraudsters then send a ‘bail bondsman’ to the victim’s address to collect the cash.

Police want to highlight that authorities in Canada do not solicit release of someone for money. Authorities in Canada do not come to your door for cash. Police are reminding the public these fraudsters are very good at what they do and are believable and to protect themselves against these frauds in the following ways:

- Fraudsters create a sense of urgency – slow things down reach out to other relatives and review the situation together, contact authorities if need be.
- If you still believe the caller then contact the authority represented through their legitimate contact source eg. website or phonebook that you have located and not provided to you by the contactor.
- Attempt to contact the family member in question.
- Do not send money, gift cards, Bitcoin or anything else of value in “urgent situations”.
- Don’t drop your guard because the number on your caller ID looks familiar or legitimate. Scammers can spoof telephone numbers and make it appear they are calling from a trusted source.

Anyone who thinks they could be a victim, knows someone who could be a victim, or has information on these incidents, is asked to contact police at 902-490-5020. The scams can also be reported to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre at 1-888-495-8501.


