NWCC UPDATE

The February 27th meeting of the North West Community Council (NWCC) dealt with:

<u>Case 24193: Development Agreement for 57</u> <u>Sanctuary Court, Fall River</u>

Public hearing held and closed. NWCC approved the DesignPoint Engineering & Surveying Ltd., on behalf of 3260579 Nova Scotia Limited (Arbor Plant Health Care), application to change the existing land use from an equestrian facility use to a tree service use in the existing buildings on 57 Sanctuary Court, Fall River.

<u>Case 22097: Development Agreement for 96</u> <u>Pockwock Road, Hammonds Plains</u>

NWCC approved the request by Beth and Dennis Hiltz to have an equestrian facility at 96 Pockwock Road in Hammonds Plains. The current zoning allows for agricultural uses, including the breeding and handling of animals. The purpose of the requested development agreement is to permit the commercial recreation aspects of an equestrian facility such as horse boarding, lessons, horse shows and educational clinics, which are not permitted as of-right under the applicable zoning. Policy P-27 of the Beaver Bank, Hammonds Plains and Upper Sackville MPS enables the development of new commercial recreation uses by development agreement.





NOVA SCOTIA POWER – EXTENDED POWER OUTAGES



The following is the response I received from Nova Scotia Power (NSP) regarding the recent extended power outages in the Fall River area during the cold weather in early February; and what is being done on a go forward basis.

Why are there many outages in Fall River during storms?

The majority of recent outages in the Fall River area are the result of more frequent storms in the province.

Outages during storms are caused mainly by high winds breaking trees and branches, which fall on our powerlines and damage our equipment. Sometimes, trees and branches that are damaged during storms don't fall until days or weeks later.

Last year was a unique year for storms and severe weather. We had eight consecutive winter storms in early 2022. In the fall, Hurricane Fiona was the most significant hurricane to ever hit

Nova Scotia and prompted the largest restoration response in our company's history.

Overall, the trend in Fall River is outages occurring during poor weather conditions, with Wind & Tree Contacts being the main cause codes used. Recently, there was also Overload conditions given the extreme cold temperatures, but that is not a normally occurring scenario.

What happened in Fall River during the extreme cold this past weekend?

This past weekend, wind gusts exceeding 70 km per hour were recorded in the Fall River area.

These strong wind gusts combined with weakened trees from past storms, including Fiona, contributed to outages in the area.

Extreme cold temperatures also resulted in a significant increase in electricity demand. We experienced a record high demand in the province on Saturday, February 4th.

As a result, in specific areas such as parts of Fall River, demand on local electrical equipment was especially high.

In some of these cases, electrical equipment became overloaded, and protection devices operated to prevent damage to the equipment and larger outages from happening., operated to prevent damage to the equipment and larger outages from happening.

ON-AND-OFF OUTAGES

Some customers in the Fall River area experienced several on-and-off outages. This happened because high demand was hovering around the limits of the protective device, during the extreme cold conditions and with the increase in power usage.

As a result, the device automatically interrupted power many times to protect the equipment, stopping a few seconds or minutes later and causing on-and-off outages to customers each time.

Once temperatures began to rise, the high demand returned to the normal levels of the protective device, and customers would have stopped experiencing these outages.

These devices prevented larger and prolonged outages from happening if the equipment had been damaged.

While larger and lengthy outages were prevented, we understand how frustrating this was for customers who were affected by these on-and-off outages.

What are you doing to improve the grid?

Our weather is changing—that's why we continue investing over \$100 million on proactive maintenance and \$20 to 25 million on tree trimming every year across the province.

What are you doing to improve reliability in the Fall River area to avoid outages?

Our forestry team is planning to trim trees along 62 km of line in the Fall River area this year.

This is a \$1.5 million investment in maintenance and improvement in reliability for customers in the area, to help reduce outages going forward.

In addition to tree clearing, there are several projects in the pipeline for a substation. The

most notable project would be to add a new feeder to the substation to alleviate loading. The exact timing and scope of this is still under development.

I hope this is helpful information for you.


