## The Chinamen's Story of Last Night's Riot

FONG QUIN, leader of the Chinese Citizens in Halifax, gave a statement to The Mail today in which he told of the origin of last night's trouble. He stated that his people, as far as he knows, are good citizens and like the people Halifax very much, who have always treated them courteously. According to Fong Quin's story, a man, partly under the influence of liquor, entered the Crown cafe on Gottingen street about 11 o'clock last night. The man ate a hearty meal, but when he was asked to pay, he refused and abused the The man was Chinese proprietor. asked to leave the place, the Chinaman being satisfied to get the man off his premises without obtaining the money for the meal. The man refused and then asked for a packages of cigarettes and placed ten cents on the counter. The Chinaman asked for five cents more, the cigarettes being fifteen cents. man suddenly switched off light and grabbed for the cash register, from which he is alleged to have taken \$75 in cash. then dashed the register thru the window and yelled for help. Chinese thru all this remained in the back of the cafe. A crowd soon collected and a rumor spread about the street that a returned soldier had been brutally assaulted by a Chinaman, which was not so. The cafe was raided and destroyed. Fong Quin says he has wired to Ottawa for the Chinese counsellor to come here. The counsellor is expected here tomorrow. Several
