### **DISTRICT 16 RESIDENTS,**

The past 14 months have been a huge challenge for our municipality, province, country, and society. However, there is light at the end of the tunnel as infection rates decrease and vaccination rates increase. Everyone has been impacted

in some way by the pandemic and by its restrictions.

HALIFAX REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY

Education, employment, health, mental health, recreation, and the economy have been dealt tremendous blows. But, we have also seen incredible examples of communities and individuals rising to help each other and innovative solutions to delivering services and programs creatively or virtually. Regional Council has re-established the programs, maintenance and service cuts brought in last year due to the pandemic. Therefore you will see more upgrades, repairs, and maintenance undertaken in our community this summer and fall.

This newsletter will highlight some of the projects, programs and progress underway or upcoming in our District. It will also provide you with an overview of Bedford Days 2021. The event information is provided here instead of the usual and separate brochure, to help us control costs. For regular updates from the Bedford Days Working Group, go to their Facebook, YouTube channel, or the Bedford Days website.

This newsletters' space is therefore more limited than usual, but I will send a second one in 2021. I encourage you to follow me on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter for almost daily updates on events and issues in our community. I also frequently send email updates. These updates are then added to my personal website, at timouthit.ca and outline what is going on at Regional Council and in our community. Later this year I will provide you with more details on key priorities such as our Bedford Waterfront public consultation process, the facilities and amenities survey results and plan, and upcoming transportation improvements. In the meantime, I am pleased to confirm that planning is underway for a ferry terminal and public library on our waterfront, and construction is starting on our Transit Park & Ride Facility in West Bedford. Council added \$1M to the speed and traffic calming budget this year to help address the over 400 approved requests and 190 awaiting evaluation.

Council cannot determine which streets are calmed or how they are calmed. This falls under the jurisdiction of the independent Traffic Authority under provincial law. We are changing overarching policy and increasing budgets in order to address your concerns and to address safety.

I encourage all residents to read the approved HRM Rapid Transit Strategy, the Bedford Highway Functional Plan, and the plan for Larry Uteck Blvd West. They can be accessed on my HRM website: www.halifax.ca/city-hall/districtscouncillors/district-16/communications.

The province continues to work on the regulations for their new Traffic Safety Act. When it is proclaimed, municipalities will be able to regulate muffler noise. They will be able to implement photo radar and red light cameras if they wish. I remain optimistic that HRM will receive approval to reduce the default speed limit in residential areas to 40km/h.

I remain grateful for the support and guidance that I have received from Mayor Savage and my Council colleagues, the CAO, our wonderful HRM staff from all departments, HRP, Halifax Fire, colleagues from other orders of government, and from you! Stay safe and have a good summer!

# TICK AWARENESS AND PREVENTION

As many of you are no doubt aware, Bedford is a known "hot-spot" for blacklegged ticks. All residents should have a basic awareness and undertake tick bite prevention as part of your daily routine. There are a number of other things that you can do to minimize bites:

- using a tick repellent that has 20% Picaridin/icaridin;
- wearing permethrin-treated clothing such as the "No Fly Zone" clothing at Mark's;
- wearing light coloured clothing to help see the ticks;
- tucking your pants into your socks and your shirt into your pants;
- carrying a small lint roller or tape to pick unattached ticks off clothing, skin, and pets;
- staying away from taller grasses by staying in the centre of trails;
- immediately putting your clothes in a hot dryer for 15-20 minutes to help dry out any hitchhiking ticks.

Ticks are here to stay so we need to learn to live with them. Educate yourself and stay safe. For more information check out shiningthelymelight.com.

## **TRAFFIC CALMING FOR SAFER STREETS**

Traffic calming helps make neighbourhoods safer. That means slowing down cars, trucks, and motorcycles by altering driver behavior.

Studies have shown that only reducing the posted speed limit in an area has no significant impact on how fast people drive. Physical measures are more effective and could include speed humps, raised intersections and crosswalks, curb extensions, traffic circles or mini roundabouts, raised median islands, or on-street parking. If your street is owned and maintained by the municipality, it may be considered for traffic calming if it:

- is within a residential area
- is classified as a "local street" or "minor collector street"
- is not a multi-lane road
- has a posted speed limit not greater than 50 km/h
- is greater than 150m in length
- does not provide direct access to an emergency services building

The following streets are scheduled for traffic calming this construction season:

- Rutledge St 2 speed tables at top of street, near playground
- Southgate Dr Speed tables where grade allows, including near playground
- Basinview Dr Speed tables where grade allows, including near school
- Oceanview Dr Speed tables where grade allows (limits from Nine Mile Drive to Royal Masts Way)
- Millrun Cres Speed tables near playground
- Madison Dr 1 speed hump in school zone
- Wimbledon Rd. 1 speed hump in school zone

You can initiate a review of traffic calming for your street by contacting 311.
