ATHORPE DRIVE STREET RECAPITILIZATION DELAYED TO 2019

The approved project for full depth asphalt renewal, curb and gutter repair and new sidewalk on Athorpe Drive from Woodlawn Road to Bowser Avenue has been delayed to 2019. The reason for the delay is to avoid construction during winter. A Contractor has been hired and will commence work as soon as conditions permit in spring 2019. The project also includes a Halifax Water infrastructure project to renew a limited number of wastewater laterals in this area.

Another notice in early 2019 will be distributed with an update on this project.


Ellenvale Run Rehabilitation Sections 3 & 8



Overview of Project

Ellenvale Run conveys the stormwater from Lemont Lake to Morris Lake. The overall project focuses on the portion of Ellenvale Run between Main Street and Portland Street, which has been significantly urbanized and now, almost entirely (90%), consists of a constructed channel instead of a natural stream.

The retaining walls along the channel consist of various materials and types; gabion basket, masonry stone walls, steel sheet piles, and precast concrete blocks. The condition of the retaining walls also varies along the channel. In some areas, the walls appear to be in relatively good condition while in others the walls are failing and temporary bracing has been installed to prevent them from falling into the stream. In an effort to stabilize the channel walls, to 'naturalize' the channel, and to reestablish or improve natural habitat, the restoration efforts of this project will use energy dissipation pools, natural pool and riffle sequencing, and natural stone on the bottom of the channel liner. This provides a naturalized stream bottom that reduces velocities, creates pools and meanders, and helps to improve fish passage.



Project Timeframe

The project has been tendered, and awarded to Brycon Construction Limited. Construction preparation work has already begun, with in-stream work scheduled to begin (weather permitting) June 21, 2018 and will continue through to October 31, 2018.

2-Week Outlook

The following brief snapshot provides an outlook of the upcoming schedule:

- October 15 - 19: Cast-in-place up-stream connection and curb, backfill channel, install in-stream vegetation, and reinstatements.
- October 22 - 26: Complete installation of in-stream vegetation, installation of railing and reinstatements.

Work will also be progressing within the channel and residents can expect to see heavy equipment within the channel removing the existing walls.

OFF-LEASH DOG AREAS – UPDATE

On October 16th, Regional Council approved the following motion regarding Off-leash dog areas:

1. Approve the general area identified on Map 1 of the [staff report](#) dated October 4, 2018 *within Don Bayer Park, 26 Troop Avenue, Dartmouth, for designation as a dedicated Off-Leash Dog Area pursuant to Administrative Order 2017-013-OP*

with requirements for hours of operation and other regulations pursuant to the [Parks By-law \(P-600\)](#), to be effective upon completion of the necessary capital work to Don Bayer Park;

2. *Direct staff to include this project in the capital prioritization exercise for consideration in the 2019/20 Capital Budget for the development of the Don Bayer Park Off-Leash Dog Area; and*
3. *Direct staff to continue with the off-leash work program as outlined in the staff report dated October 4, 2018.*

The Off-leash Area Program was approved on November 19, 2015 as a permanent service. In January 2018, Regional Council confirmed the continuation of the existing off-leash areas, previously implemented as part of the pilot program. The program as it exists today consists of off-leash areas within eight parks, as well as the use of 30 sports field locations (6 available for summer use and 29 available for winter use). A list of the existing off-leash areas can be found in Attachment A and is illustrated on [Map 2](#) (shown below).

Halifax Water Board Approves Open Board Meetings

(Friday, October 12, 2018) – At the September 27, 2018 meeting of the Halifax Water Board, a Resolution was passed that will see future meetings of the Halifax Water Board be open to the public.

The Resolution comes following the support and encouragement of Mayor Mike Savage and then Municipal Affairs Minister Zach Churchill in 2016.

Halifax Water Board Chair Ray Ritcey said, “The move to open board meetings follows public Annual General Meetings held on August 14, 2017 and July 18, 2018, as well as regular public rate hearings before the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board. This demonstrates Halifax Water’s continued commitment to the customers we serve.”

The first public Board meeting is scheduled for April 1, 2019. Details on the format, location and time of the Board meeting have yet to be finalized.

Halifax Regional Municipality and RBC announced the bank is investing \$1-million (\$10,000 per year for 10 years) into the future of the Dartmouth 4-Pad by becoming the new naming rights partner. The new partnership includes the renaming of the facility to RBC Centre, as well as a commitment to programming, such as clinics with RBC Olympians and RBC Family Days, which will enhance the community's involvement and participation at the arena.

The facility has experienced an estimated 1.5 million visits by the community since it opened just over a year ago, making the newly named RBC Centre a hub for sports year-round. *“The RBC Centre brings together people from across our region, and is an important part of our shared commitment with RBC to invest in healthy, livable communities,”* said Mayor Mike Savage.





Halifax and West Community Council and regularly scheduled standing committees that would normally meet in the Council Chamber will now meet either in Halifax Hall (at City Hall), or at the Harbour East Marine Drive Community Council Chamber in Dartmouth. The technology enhancements include HD cameras, new displays for the public gallery, and a new graphics package that will display names of speakers, motions, and vote results. Accessibility will also be improved through the installation of technology that will enhance the ability to hear what's being said in the Council Chamber.
