### POST STORM UPDATE



Hurricane Dorian hit on Saturday September 7<sup>th</sup> and I am so impressed with how our Emergency Management Office handled this storm and were able to quickly mitigate the effects.

Debris and tree removal efforts are well underway, with most main arteries passable with caution.

Members of the municipal urban forestry teams are busy identifying priority locations and crews, with support from contractors, are working to chip and remove downed trees, clean up debris, and replanting trees that can be saved.

For safety reasons, residents are advised to not attempt to assist with clearing downed trees in the municipal right-of-way. Those trees will be handled by professional crews. However, residents are responsible for tree maintenance on their own properties.

Branches should be tied in armload-sized bundles, to a maximum of 10 bundles, for collection day over the next two weeks. This service is free of charge. Any materials larger than this should be delivered to construction and demolition locations at Halifax C&D Recycling Ltd. (16 Mills Dr. in Goodwood), or 188 Ross Rd., in Westphal. There is a fee charged by these private service providers.

While considerable progress is being made with post-storm clean-up efforts, there are still many intersections throughout the community where traffic signals are not functioning. Motorists are reminded to treat these intersections as a four-way stop.



### SHANNON PARK UPDATE

Schooners Sports and Entertainment (SSE), the organization proposing a community stadium, will be bringing a business case to Regional Council soon.

Shannon Park is owned by the Canada Lands Company (CLC) and they have agreed to consider this use if certain conditions are met:

- SSE and HRM are required to undertake public engagement with the community;
- HRM and the Province indicate their support for the community stadium for municipal and broader regional community benefit;
- Canada Lands Company and SSE coordinate efforts with the Millbrook First Nation and their neighbouring development plans; and
- HRM approve a revised concept plan – one which includes the development principles supported by the community during Canada Lands Company’s initial consultation process.

The proposal will include a new artist rendering and suggests a \$130-million stadium with 12,000 permanent seats and a capability of adding 12,000 more temporary seats.

Shannon Park is an 82-acre property and the proposed land purchase would be about 20 acres of that land. No agreements or sales have been approved at this time. The stadium would only take a small portion of the land if approved, the rest is proposed to be used for mixed use community development and active transportation opportunities.



### URBAN FOREST MASTER PLAN MAINTENANCE

The Urban Forest Master Plan is a strategy that aims to ensure the sustainable future of our urban forest. Street trees improve air quality, provide temperature management, storm-water reduction and many more environmental and aesthetic benefits. Internal staff have been trying to keep up with the maintenance of trees that need to be trimmed or removed, but we are now issuing a tender to have all trees planted from 2013-2017 that have died removed by an outside contractor. 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### PET PICK UP

Animal waste contains bacteria and parasites, such as, E.coli, giardia and salmonella. Waste washes from our streets and parks into our waterways which pollutes our watershed. This poses a health risk to both humans and other animals, so the Halifax Regional Municipality is encouraging residents to be mindful and pick up after your pets. Please make sure to bring plastic bags when you walk the dog so you can dispose of waste in a garbage can. All pet waste must be disposed of as garbage. Dog bag dispensers are available at Lake MicMac and we encourage pet owners to use these dispensers if they forget their own bags. Lake MicMac provides plastic bags and accessible garbage cans to ensure convenience. The plastic bags contain recycled plastic material to help reduce plastic waste.

### ROAD OPERATIONS AND CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Thank you to our Road Operations and Construction (ROC) crews who are continuing to work hard repairing and updating our roads and sidewalks. Since the construction season began in April, ROC has impressively completed more than 9,000 improvements to municipal assets. These enhancements include filling approximately 4,400 potholes, mitigating more than 600 potential sidewalk hazards and disposing of thousands of pounds of litter from our outdoor spaces. ### FIRE INVESTIGATION UPDATE

Halifax Regional Fire & Emergency (HRFE) investigators are classifying the cause of the February fatal house fire on Quartz Drive in Halifax as undetermined. HRFE investigators consulted with the provincial Fire Marshal's Office and the investigator with the property owner's insurance company. Everyone came to the same conclusions. Fire investigations by their nature are challenging and very difficult to solve because valuable evidence can be lost in a fire. Clues that might lead investigators in a certain direction are destroyed. It's not unusual to conclude a fire investigation without being able to identify a cause. Since January 2015, the cause in 25% of major fires in the municipality were classified as undetermined. The fire department will continue to investigate the cause of this fire if new information becomes available. Since the tragic fire in February HRFE has:

- Organized eight fire safety presentations
- Attended with fire prevention booths at three public events
- Held two train-the-trainer events where we advised the new trainers on what fire safety information they should consider/avoid in their sessions, and what resources are available to them.
- Added a link on the municipal website to [multi-language fire safety tip sheets](#).

HRFE also has two programs aimed at equipping citizens with valuable fire prevention tips and tools.

The first is HRFE's 'Alarmed and Ready' program, which provides residents with smoke and/or carbon monoxide detectors if they cannot afford one. In addition, HRFE recently introduced the Practice Using Safety at Home (PUSH) program, which puts fire crews into the community, performing home visits. These home visits include education on civic numbering, emergency preparedness, the importance of early warning devices, and a demonstration on how to maintain and test smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. 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### HALIFAX TRANSIT'S FEED NOVA SCOTIA CONTRIBUTION

Each year on Canada Day and Natal Day, Halifax Transit offers free ferry service for residents with the request that monetary and food donations be made to Feed Nova Scotia in lieu of fare payment. Halifax Transit also facilitates Stuff-A-Bus, an annual Christmas program where local organizations fill a bus with food items to support families through the holidays.

This year, Feed Nova Scotia was thrilled to receive \$7,699.86 in monetary donations from passengers on Natal Day weekend. Halifax Transit is grateful to be part of such an important collaboration and is committed to the continued growth of this and other programs intended to help Nova Scotian residents in need.

### JUNE VEHICLE/PEDESTRIAN COLLISION STATISTICS

Halifax Regional Police (HRP) and Halifax District RCMP release a monthly vehicle/pedestrian collision report to provide police and citizens with more contextual information on this issue.

A total of 107 vehicle/pedestrian/bicycle collisions have been reported from January to June 2019 in Halifax Regional Municipality. This represents a decrease of four incident over the same time period in 2018. There were 7 incidents in June.

### INTEGRATED MOBILITY PLAN UPDATE

The Integrated Mobility Plan was approved by Regional Council in December 2017. The plan creates a vision to help direct future investment in transportation demand management, transit, active transportation, and the roadway network.
