ACTION ON HOMELESSNESS



The Halifax Regional Municipality's priority has been, and continues to

be, treating those experiencing homelessness with dignity – and continuing to work with community partners to find ways to provide support to them within our organization's capacity and scope. The following is an update on ongoing efforts to help address homelessness in our region.

New Emergency Shelter

 The municipality is supporting the Province of Nova Scotia in the operation of an emergency shelter for those

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- experiencing homelessness. The 24-hour shelter, located at 197-199 Windmill Road in Dartmouth, opened on Friday, November 17th and will remain open for the next 30 months, until May 2026.
- Starting with 50 beds for people of all genders – including youth aged 16 and older, if needed – the shelter can add more beds based on community need and extreme weather events as well as accommodating people with pets.
- The municipality will be providing in-kind property maintenance support for the shelter site, including required inspections and any necessary work to bring the site to compliance. The municipality will also be providing regular garbage pickup and snow clearing.
- The province will be prioritizing those living in encampments for placement in the shelter. Municipal staff will ensure those staying in encampments are aware of the shelter, how to access it, and facilitate relocation to the shelter.

Grand Parade

- With the new emergency shelter that is now open, there is an alternative location for those currently sheltering in Grand Parade.
- Municipal outreach workers and street navigators are engaged with those sheltered in the Grand Parade to assist in their relocation.

• There are 8 designated <u>outdoor</u> <u>sheltering spaces</u> at Grand Parade.

Status of Halifax Christmas Tree Lighting

- The Christmas Tree was placed in the Grand Parade on November 16th. Holiday festivities, typically associated with the tree lighting, took place at Peace and Friendship Park on Saturday, November 25th.
- The lighting of the tree in Grand Parade occurred at the conclusion of the Saltwire Parade of Lights on November 25th.

Waverley Inn Shelter

- The former Waverley Inn in Halifax's south end is set to host a new temporary supportive housing facility for women and gender-diverse people experiencing homelessness. The shelter is planned to open in December.
- YWCA Halifax will provide 24-hour onsite support for up to 32 residents, including referrals to mental health and addictions counselling, employment services and skills training.
- The municipality will be providing in-kind property maintenance support for the shelter site, including required inspections and any work required to bring the site to compliance. The municipality will also be providing regular garbage pickup and snow clearing.

Tiny Home Community

 The municipality is working with the Province of Nova Scotia to build a tiny home community. This pilot community



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will have 52 units, providing housing for about 62 people. The community will be built on surplus municipal land in Lower Sackville. This surplus land is currently being used as a designated outdoor sheltering location.

- It is anticipated that 30 units will be complete by next spring and people will be in them next summer. The remaining 22 units are expected to be complete by next fall. If successful, similar communities may be created in other areas of the municipality and across the province.
- Rent will be geared to income, which
 means that rent will be no more than 30
 per cent of a person's income. Community
 residents will be selected from the HRM
 By Name List and will receive the
 wraparound support they need to help
 them connect to employment and more
 permanent housing.
- The municipality is providing the land at no cost and will also be providing regular garbage pickup, snow clearing and general property maintenance.

Pallet Shelters

- In partnership with the Province of Nova Scotia and service providers, 100 pallet shelters will be installed in the municipality. The provincial funding will also provide bed frames, mattresses and desks, as well as support operations for the pallet shelter village.
- Pallet is a North American leader in rapidresponse shelter villages designed by people with lived experience. These

- communities will include single occupancy rooms, plus bathroom and laundry units and on-site supports by local service providers.
- The Province of Nova Scotia will provide two parcels of provincial land in the municipality to host the pallet shelter villages. The municipality is providing additional land, land servicing and preparation support, as well as operational oversight of the 100 units.

Informational video series via social media

- The municipality will be launching a series of informational videos addressing commonly asked questions about the current homelessness situation in the region.
- Each video will feature municipal staff –
 including Max Chauvin, Director of
 Housing & Homelessness as well as
 community partners and will be posted
 on the municipality's Instagram,
 Facebook, Twitter (X), LinkedIn and
 YouTube accounts. Residents will be
 encouraged to leave their questions in the
 comments, where they will be answered
 and potentially form the topics of future
 videos.
- This initiative supports one of the four roles within the mandate of the municipality identified in the Framework for Addressing Homelessness: supporting public education efforts.
- The videos will be published on the Helping address homelessness webpage at the end of the series.

The Halifax Regional
Municipality received an A
grade from the <u>Carbon</u>
<u>Disclosure Project (CDP)</u> for our
commitment to climate action

and environmental protection. CDP is a global, non-profit charity that runs the world's disclosure system for investors, companies, cities, states and regions to assess their environmental impact.

Only 13% of cities got an A for their efforts in 2023. Being in CDP's top tier means that our ambitious climate action plan HalifACT is being recognized internationally for its emphasis on transparency and its bold climate leadership.

CDP reporting is a commitment of Regional Council. We are going to keep working to sharply reduce our greenhouse gas emissions as a way of protecting our residents from the effects of climate change and ensuring the health of our economy.



We don't do it for the good grades, we do it for the future of our community. Getting an A from an organization like CDP is an important sign that we're on the right track.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING UPDATE

On November 14th, Regional Council passed a <u>series of motions</u> to amend, improve, and advance affordable housing in the municipality. A full overview of the motions and background information can be found in the <u>staff report</u>.

At the November 14 Regional Council Meeting, the motion was advanced that the <u>Administrative Order Number 2020-007-ADM Respecting Incentive or Bonus Zoning Public Benefits</u> and <u>Administrative Order Number 2020-008-ADM Respecting Grants for Affordable Housing</u> both be amended, so that money collected through the <u>Interim Density Bonus Program</u> can be used to fund eligible public benefits, including affordable housing, in the Suburban Area (outside the Regional Centre). This will ensure that the Halifax Regional Municipality can fund affordable housing projects throughout the entire municipality to ultimately support more residents in need.



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At the same Regional Council meeting, staff also recommended expanding eligible partnerships between private businesses and Non-Profit Organizations (NPO), by allowing eligible NPOs to lease privately owned property or housing and maintain their eligibility for Affordable Housing Grants Program funding.

Additionally, on November 14, in light of Bill 329 and the Interim Density Bonus Program, staff also recommended that, for the 2023/2024 Grant year, \$200,000 be allocated from the Housing Accelerator Fund to support suburban and rural affordable housing projects.

Finally, a motion was advanced for a review of the Affordable Housing Grant Program to be undertaken before the 2024/25 grant year to ensure the ongoing effectiveness of this program. For more information, <u>click here</u>.

VOLUNTARY VULNERABLE PERSONS REGISTRY

Halifax Regional Municipality has launched a Voluntary Vulnerable Persons Registry (VVPR) to assist residents who may require more support during emergency situations. The VVPR provides essential information to first responders and Emergency Management staff and volunteers to help prioritize responses to residents' needs in situations such as sustained power outages or severe storms.

The VVPR is a voluntary, self-referral list intended for residents without 24-hour support who experience severe difficulty with any of the following:

- mobility
- vision impairment
- hearing impairment
- developmental disabilities
- cognitive impairment

- mental health conditions
- any resident who requires electricity for life-sustaining equipment such as oxygen, dialysis, etc.

Those not eligible include (exceptions may apply):

- residents receiving 24-hour support from a caregiver or home care aide
- residents receiving care or assistance from a long-term care home or supportive housing facility
- residents under the age of 18 who receive parent/guardian support; however, children with intensive needs that require electricity for life sustaining equipment may be considered

Applications can be submitted only by individuals seeking to become part of the VVPR or their representative/legal guardian. All applications will be reviewed by municipal staff to confirm eligibility and verify personal information upon submission of the self-referral online application form.

When the VVPR program is activated, a warning will be sent through hfxALERT, the municipality's mass notification system, to registrants, their representative/legal guardian and emergency contacts.

Emergency Management staff will then conduct phone calls if needed or attempt door-to-door contact through Emergency Management volunteers.

After the event, Emergency Management staff will provide check-in communications through



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hfxALERT to registrants, their representative / legal guardian and emergency contacts.

Prioritization checks will be conducted based on personal information included in the registration form, with door-to-door contact, as necessary. To learn more about the VVPR and to register, visit: halifax.ca/vvpr.

PERFORMING & VISUAL ARTS VENUES STUDY



The Halifax Regional Municipality is seeking public input on the Performing & Visual Arts Venues Study.

Happy Cities, on behalf of the municipality, are conducting a study of performing and visual arts venues across the region. The study will help improve the municipality's understanding of professional art venue operations, identify challenges facing existing art venues, identify the needs of the local arts and culture community and inform the municipality's long-term approach to supporting, renewing and investing in professional arts venues.

As part of the Performing & Visual Arts Venues Study's engagement program, Happy Cities is seeking feedback from users of performing and December 2023

arts venues on their experience with these facilities. Happy Cities is also releasing a second survey to collect input from Indigenous artists and peoples.

The two surveys are available here: <u>Public</u> <u>Survey</u> and an <u>Indigenous Residents Survey</u>. The surveys will remain open until Friday, December 15th.

The Performing & Visual Arts Venues Study is expected to be completed by June 2024, and may lead to the creation of a Professional Arts Venues Plan.


