Agreement, 1036 Lucasville Road, Lucasville

NWCC gave notice of motion for the proposed amendment to the existing Timber Trails Mobile Home Park development agreement to expand the area. There is a small portion of the existing sewage treatment facility that currently supports the mobile home park which is not included within the bounds of the existing development agreement. This amendment will correct that issue.

MI'KMAW HISTORY MONTH



October is Mi'kmaq History Month, a time to commemorate the rich history, proud culture

and important contributions of the Mi'kmaq people. In 1993, Premier John Savage and Mi'kmaw Grand Chief Ben Sylliboy declared October as the official month to recognize and celebrate Mi'kmaw culture and heritage. Treaty Day, October 1st, officially kicks-off a month of celebrations. This year's theme is Mi'kmaw Traditional Games & Sports.

The following are some ways you can recognize Treaty Day and Mi'kmaq History Month: Events:

- In honour of Treaty Day, October 1st, the Mi'kmaw Native Friendship Centre in partnership with the municipality hosted a traditional salmon meal with a vendor market. More details are available here.
- A church service at St. Mary's Cathedral Basilica on Spring Garden Road took place on October 1st at 10:30 a.m.
- On October 2nd at 10:00 a.m., the flag raising event at Grand Parade, was held including a reading of the Treaty Day Proclamation by Mayor Mike Savage.
- Throughout the month of October, show your support of Indigenous communities by wearing orange.

BI-WEEKLY GREEN CART COLLECTION

SOLID WASTE STRATEGY - SURVEY



The Halifax Regional Municipality is conducting a review of its solid waste strategy. This review will focus on strategic initiatives that need to be implemented over the next five to seven years to achieve 2030 objectives and work toward meeting 2050 objectives, including:

- Maximizing reduction, reuse, and recycling of waste resources
- Maximizing environmental and fiscal sustainability of the waste program
- Fostering public stewardship and conservation
- Aligning with <u>HalifACT goals</u> (new)
- Contributing to the <u>2022 Environmental</u> <u>Goals and Climate Change Reduction Act</u> (new)

From September 25th to October 31st, residents will be able to provide feedback on the future of our municipality's solid waste system through a <u>survey</u>. The survey is focused on obtaining residents' input on the proposed objectives of the strategy review, levels of service delivery, and resident satisfaction with current solid waste services. Several options will be available for residents to access the survey:

- Printed copies (regular and large font)

 - Requests for mailed copies must be received by October 25th to allow for return mail
- Printed copies will be available for pickup at each of the municipal <u>Customer</u> <u>Service Centres</u> at Alderney Gate, Bayers Road and Musquodoboit Harbour locations.
- Solid Waste staff will be present at various events to promote and conduct surveys in person
 - A list of dates/locations will be updated on <u>Shape Your City</u>

Anyone who requires assistance completing the survey may request an in-person, online or phone meeting by calling <u>311</u>.

This project is funded in part by the <u>Sustainable</u> <u>Communities Challenge Fund</u> – a Nova Scotia provincial grant initiative administered by the <u>Nova Scotia Federation of Municipalities</u>. In part, this fund supports the implementation of

initiatives that avoid and reduce greenhouse gas emissions and contribute to Nova Scotia's targets for emission reduction. Through this grant, the municipality will receive up to \$306,000 towards eligible expenses associated with the strategy review (approximately 60% of the project budget).

WAVERLEY ROAD - GUIDE RAIL



From September 21st to October 2nd the Halifax Regional Municipality carried out construction work in the area of **1464 Waverley Road** that required a short period of one lane stop-and-go traffic. The old guiderail and concrete barriers were removed and the shoreline stabilized with riprap to protect against erosion and widened the shoulder to make room for the new guiderail. The construction work generally consists of guide rail removal and disposal, the installation of new guiderail, tree removal, road shoulder widening and embankment erosion protection

Unfortunately, the work planned for the area of **1291 Waverley Road**, will not be completed in 2023 due to delays associated with environmental permitting.

Construction work is planned for the summer of 2024 including road shoulder widening, guiderail replacement, retaining wall installation, and road embankment stabilization. Barriers will remain in place in the meantime to provide protection to the traveling public.

Nova Scotia Works job fairs provide an opportunity for job seekers from all backgrounds to directly meet a wide range of employers and promote themselves," said Philip Cantrill, Executive Director, Job Junction - Nova Scotia Works.

Over 1000 job seekers are expected to attend the event for the chance to meet hiring managers and talk their way into an interview or even a job. Employers include large and medium businesses, government, and small businesses from a variety of sectors.

Career practitioners from Nova Scotia Works centres across HRM and East Hants will be offering workshops in advance of the Fall Job Fair to help job seekers navigate this free,

FALL RIVER | WAVERLEY - SIDEWALK



HRM Staff have advised that there are currently no sidewalk projects near term in the area of Fall River and Waverley. However, an analysis of road segments was run and there are sections of Fall

River and Waverley where the need for new sidewalks rate relatively high. This means that when a larger road rehabilitation project is happening, we would consider adding a new sidewalk. Whether a sidewalk is added largely

depends on the available budget as well as other factors like property needs and constructability.

Staff recently ran a high-level evaluation for sidewalks in the Fall River / Waverley area. There were segments on the following streets that rated "above average" or "high". Some of these streets already have sidewalks yet rated higher for sidewalks on the opposite side.

Fall River

- Fall River Road
- Jamieson Drive
- Arnold Drive
- Lockview Road
- Highway 2

Waverley

- Rocky Lake Drive
- Cobequid Road
- Waverley Road

As explained earlier, there are no plans for these projects to be completed any time soon. They will be considered when a larger road rehabilitation project is undertaken pending budget approval. For information on how the decision is made on sidewalks, click here.

RIGHT-OF-WAY CHARGE

The Halifax Regional Municipality advises that the Right-of-Way (ROW) charge (formerly referred to as the "Stormwater Right-of-Way charge") has moved from the Halifax Water bill to the municipal tax bill.

The ROW charge will change from a flat \$40 annual fee that has previously appeared on





residents' Halifax Water bill (as either a one-time lump sum or quarterly charge) to a new amount (based on the assessed value of the property) that will appear on their next municipal property tax bill in fall 2023.

The ROW charge is for the maintenance of roads, bridges, trees, lighting, signage and guard rails, as well as for the management of stormwater that comes from the public street right-of-way into Halifax Water's stormwater system.

Stormwater is the water from rain, melted snow and ice that runs off from roofs, parking lots, driveways and other hard surfaces. The municipality is responsible for paying Halifax Water for the impact on their stormwater system.

The municipality's ROW charge applies to all properties within the municipal stormwater service boundary. Roads within the municipal stormwater service boundary are owned by the municipality and the services are provided by both the municipality and Halifax Water. For roads outside of the service boundary, services are provided by the Province of Nova Scotia. Halifax Water will continue to collect a separate Stormwater (Site-Related Flow) charge, which can be found at: halifaxwater.ca/rates.

The mobile drop-off depots will be in operation from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and will take place rain or shine.

Materials accepted at the household drop-off depot include:

- leftover corrosive cleaners
- pesticides/herbicides
- gasoline
- fuel oil and used motor oil (or find a <u>collection site</u> with Atlantic Used Oil Management Association)
- solvents
- thinners

- pharmaceuticals and drugs (or <u>return to</u> <u>pharmacy</u>)
- aerosol cans containing hazardous substances
- barbecue propane tanks
- small propane cylinders (for example, those used for camp stoves and propane torches)
- batteries (visit <u>call2recycle.ca</u> for a full list of retail drop-off locations for batteries)
- leftover liquid paint (paint and empty paint cans may also be returned to any Enviro-Depot. Please visit their website for locations and hours of operation).
- CFL and fluorescent bulbs

The municipality also operates a permanent Household Special Waste Depot at 20 Horseshoe Lake Drive. Drop-off times are on most Saturdays between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. The household special waste drop-off depots are open only to residents of the Halifax Regional Municipality. Business waste is not permitted.

MUNICIPAL PROPERTY TAX

The municipality invoices property tax bills to all property owners twice each year. The tax year covers the fiscal period of April 1st – March 31st. Click here for property tax payment information.

 The first tax bill will be sent out in March and is due on the last working day of April. The second and final bill will be

- sent out in September and is due on the last working day of October.
- The first (or interim) invoice is based on 50 per cent of the current year's estimated taxes, which is the current year's assessment of your property value based on this year's proposed rates. The final invoice is calculated using the current assessment with the current year's rates, less the amount you already paid from the first invoice.
- Tax calculations are based on the taxable assessed value of the property multiplied by the applicable tax rate.
 The taxable assessed value is determined by the Property Valuation Services Corporation. The tax rate is the sum of two levies: a general rate (urban, suburban, or rural) and the area rates for your district.

MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT RCMP DETACHMENT



The new RCMP Detachment in Middle Musquodoboit is a 196 square meter modular building that was constructed by <u>CORCAN</u> at the Dorchester Penitentiary and delivered to site. CORCAN is a key rehabilitation program of the Correctional Service of Canada (CSC) that offers employment training and employability skills to offenders in federal correctional institutions, to support rehabilitation and help lower rates of reoffending. As a key rehabilitation program for CSC, CORCAN uses on-the-job training for sectors such as construction, to help offenders develop and practice essential employment skills.

This pilot project between the RCMP and CORCAN was the first time CORCAN built an RCMP detachment in Atlantic Canada. The total cost of the project totalled \$2.5 million and went from concept to completion in 13 months. As the pilot project has been deemed successful, the RCMP will be re-using this design, and delivery methodology at other locations in Atlantic Canada in the future.
