

## **Changes to Winter Operations Aim to Improve Service**

The Halifax Regional Municipality has made some changes to its Winter Operations Program this season that aim to improve service for residents.

Last winter was among the worst in decades with above average snowfall, colder than normal temperatures, flash-freezing, multiple-day storms, freezing rain and drifting snow, all of which seriously hampered snow and ice management in all areas of the Halifax region.

As a result, the municipality spent the off-season reviewing the Winter Operations Program, both internally and through an independent consultant, with an eye to incorporating lessons learned in order to deliver better results. The changes are expected to improve service and accountability internally, and ensure contractors have the experience, equipment and capacity to better deal with both typical and extraordinary winter conditions.

Street clearing contracts awarded this summer expanded the geographic area to be covered by fixed-cost contractors, helping to stabilize expenditures. Those contracts are designed to deliver better coordination between street and sidewalk operators, particularly in areas with limited space for snow storage. This change is intended to reduce instances of street plows depositing snow on sidewalks that were recently plowed.



The municipality has also secured access to more equipment, including graders, sidewalk machinery

and backhoes. With more equipment on retainer and a smaller geographic area to clear, our in-house crews should be better positioned to improve service delivery in the areas they are responsible for – primarily downtown Halifax and Dartmouth, Clayton Park and the surrounding areas, and the Burnside Industrial Park.

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Monitoring and measuring plays an important part in improving service delivery and accountability. This season vehicle tracking technology will be used on all municipal equipment to provide real-time information for staff. Among other things, this will enable supervisors to track where our equipment has been and where it is currently, which is useful for identifying the nearest piece of equipment when a call comes in from emergency services.

The municipality has also assigned more of its staff to oversee contractors and ensure timely, safe and efficient clearing in all neighbourhoods.

Last winter reinforced the importance of securing off-street parking during the winter months so that operators can properly clear the streets and sidewalks. The overnight winter parking ban will be in place again this season and the city is stepping up efforts with ticketing and towing vehicles, with a greater focus on areas like bus routes, streets around hospitals and schools, and typically problematic areas for snow equipment and emergency vehicles.

Finally, to help ensure a timely response to public inquiries, 311 Halifax now has a designated Winter Operations role that will handle all email and online service requests during the winter months. This position will also serve as a centralized dispatcher for snow-related calls that require follow-up action. Residents are reminded that if they contact 311, whether electronically or by phone, about snow or ice removal during a weather event or while we are still within the timelines identified in the service standards, their concern will be recorded but not dispatched, as it's expected crews will get to all areas as they're able.

Residents are encouraged to report any issues once the timelines have expired. They can call 311, email <a href="mailto:contact@halifax.ca">contact@halifax.ca</a> or fill out an online service request at <a href="mailto:apps.halifax.ca/311">apps.halifax.ca/311</a>. This will help reduce contact volume and ensure that residents trying to reach 311 with urgent issues aside from snow are able to get through to an agent in a timely fashion.

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### **Preparing for the Winter Season**

The Halifax Regional Municipality is prepared for the arrival of winter weather and is encouraging residents to do the same before the snow starts to fall. No one knows for sure what this winter has in store, but by working together, we can ensure we're all better prepared for whatever the season may bring. Here are some simple steps that everyone can take to help protect your property and ensure clearing goes as safely and smoothly as possible:

- Trim any tree branches and shrubs that originate from your property. These can obstruct access and visibility for snowclearing equipment.
- Remove planters, lawn decorations and any other portable objects near the sidewalk before the winter.
- Business owners should refrain from placing sandwich boards and other portable signs on the sidewalk, as these obstruct snow clearing and salting.
- Items like sports equipment that may still be used during the winter should be safely stored when bad weather is in the forecast.
- Mark any permanent structures or objects too big to move with a reflector that will be visible above the snow. This helps crews identify obstacles.

Preparing your property also means preparing your vehicles. This is the time of year when motorists should consider tires that have better traction for winter driving. Make an appointment now to change your tires, before you get caught in that first

storm. It's also a good idea to carry a winter survival kit in your vehicle when travelling during the winter months.



Last winter taught us the importance of securing off-street parking so that

operators can safely and efficiently clear the streets. The overnight winter parking ban will be in place again this season, starting December 15<sup>th</sup>. Even when the parking ban is not enforced, residents are asked to think before you park. Ask yourself:

- By parking here, is my car causing a safety issue?
- Is it making the road impassable?
- Is it obstructing snow clearing?

If you've answered yes to any of these questions, don't park there. The city is stepping up winter parking enforcement, so those in violation will be ticketed or towed at the owner's cost. Officers will focus especially on areas like bus routes, streets around hospitals and schools and typically problematic areas for snow equipment and emergency vehicles.

Vehicles on the street are not the only issue.
Residents are also reminded that vehicles hanging out of a driveway or parked on the sidewalk during a storm or clearing operations are prone to damage and become a dangerous obstacle for crews. Such obstacles prevent crews from clearing the sidewalks



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properly, which can quickly become an issue for pedestrians, including seniors, people with mobility issues and parents pushing strollers.

The easiest way to know when the overnight parking ban will be enforced is to sign up for notifications. Residents can also email a request to contact@halifax.ca or call 311. For those who signed up last season, you will continue to receive notifications when the ban will be enforced.



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Halifax Transit invites Residents to Name New Harbor Ferry

Halifax Transit is once again asking residents to submit suggestions to name its newest replacement harbour ferry, expected to go into service in 2016.

Earlier this year residents voted to name the fifth harbour ferry in the fleet "Craig Blake" in honour of the first Canadian sailor to be killed in the line of duty in Afghanistan. He was part of an elite navy group that specialized in neutralizing bombs, underwater and on land. Blake was based at Fleet Diving Unit Atlantic in Halifax.

Until Sunday, December 13, residents can submit their name idea for the new vessel online at <a href="https://halifax.ca/surveys">halifax.ca/surveys</a>.

Halifax Transit and Corporate Communications staff will review all submissions and narrow it down to a short list based on appropriateness, originality, cultural significance and diversity. A selection committee comprised of Mayor Mike Savage and one member from each of the three community councils will then develop a final list of five names from which residents can vote for their favourite.

The name receiving the most votes will adorn the new ferry, subject to final approval by Transport Canada. The resident who submits the winning name will receive a one-year conventional transit pass courtesy of Halifax Transit and the municipality.

Residents are encouraged to submit as many name suggestions as they wish and to check <a href="halifax.ca">halifax.ca</a> over the coming weeks for the opportunity to vote for a winner.



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### Changes to Animals and Responsible Pet Ownership Bylaw

In November Regional Council approved a new animal bylaw that will simplify the administrative framework for registering a pet, and includes amendments to help keep animals and the public safer.



One of the biggest changes in the new bylaw (A-700 – Animals and Responsible Pet Ownership), is a restriction on the leash length for pets. Leashes can now no longer exceed three metres (10-feet). The leash also must be held securely by a person. There was previously no limit on the length of a leash.

The municipality is also introducing the option of a lifetime licence for an animal with a microchip. The one-time cost is \$200, with a reduced rate of \$75 for spayed/neutered animals, and a 50 per cent discount for seniors. The option still exists to renew pet licences annually. The annual licence will now expire 12 months from the date of purchase, rather than expiring every year at the end of March and being charged at a pro-rated cost if the licence is purchased throughout the year.

Registering your pet provides the peace of mind in knowing compliance officers will attempt to return lost pets to their owners before resorting to dropping the animal off at a shelter, which comes with an added cost and stress to the animal.

Other changes adopted in the updated animal bylaw include new rules for tethering, muzzles, noise, and the issue of stray livestock, including poultry. Specifically, wherever livestock is currently permitted in the municipality, the owner must ensure the animals are prevented from running at large. Bylaw A-700 also gives authority to issue orders to build and/or repair a structure to contain the livestock.

### **Heating Assistance Rebate Program**

The Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP) provides help to lower-income Nova Scotians with the cost of home heating. You qualify for this program if you pay a heating bill at your current address and meet ONE of the following criteria: live alone with an income of \$27,000 or less; live with others and have a combined income of \$42,000 or less; receive Income Assistance from the



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Department of Community Services; or, receive the Guaranteed Income Supplement from Service Canada. HARP applications are now available! Please find the HARP 2015-16 application form <a href="here">here</a>.

You must apply by March 31, 2016 to receive a rebate.

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
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## **Efficiency Nova Scotia Holiday Light Exchange**
