Innovative Apps4Halifax Contest to be Launched

HRM is launching an innovative open data application contest in August.

The open data application contest idea grew from Council's decision last fall to provide free access for the public to 17 sets of HRM databases on a pilot project basis. Databases from civic addresses to crime stats, to bus stops to garbage collection routes are now available online. As part of the pilot project, HRM will host a "Apps4Halifax" contest to inspire the development of innovative and user-friendly applications using HRM data.

The contest will feature four categories including: "Keep her moving"- for all aspects of transportation; "Live It Up"- culture & recreation; "Going Green" environmental initiatives like recycling; and "Your City" for general data like crime stats, etc. One of the requirements with the contest will be that at least one of HRM's data sets are used. However, apps developers may apply outside data from provincial sources, and others, and are not just restricted to one of the 17 sets of data released by HRM for the app development for the contest. The idea phase will be floated in August, with the actual

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contest to run from September through November. The contest deadline for submissions is December 1, 2013, with winners being announced in January 2014. The judging panel for the contest will consist of industry professionals, academics, a Councillor, the Mayor and possibly a celebrity judge.

Following an evaluation of the initial data release and results of the application contest, HRM staff will bring forward a report to Regional Council with recommendations on how to move forward on expanding HRM's open data program. Check out http://www.apps4halifax.ca for more information.

New Lacewood Bus Terminal



On Tuesday, July 23, Halifax Regional Council approved a new \$8-million bus terminal on Lacewood Drive.

The proposed site would be built between the Canada Games Centre and Mainland North Linear Parkway Trail. This site provides opportunities for active transportation connections, as well as enhances the level of public transit available at the Mainland Common for uses such as the Keshen Goodman Library, Canada Games Centre, baseball diamonds, Halifax West High School, Soccer Nova Scotia, and passive recreational opportunities.

There is also significant existing and potential ridership within close proximity to the site terminal.

On July 23 Regional Council approved a report

from the Asset Naming Committee which

recommended 23 names be added to the commemorative name list. In District 9 the Willett Street Reserve will be renamed to Mary Clayton Memorial Park.

Mary Clayton was born in England on May 23, 1819. She and her husband immigrated to Halifax in 1863 with their seven children. Her husband passed away a year later leaving Mary a widow with seven young children. Mary established a second-hand clothing business in their home. Over the years, M. Clayton & Sons grew to become a thriving business. In 1895 they built a five story factory at the corner of Barrington and Jacob Streets (now Scotia Square). It was the largest clothing manufacturer east of Montreal, and employed between 400 and 500

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people in the best equipped clothing factory in Canada. The company offered innovative profitsharing, and medical and savings plans for their employees, unusual for the time. During both World Wars, Clayton & Sons contributed to the war effort by manufacturing uniforms for the armed forces. In 1904, the Clayton family built a summer home in the southern end of Rockingham Village, which was later converted into a permanent residence. In 1959, the property was sold to developers, who planned and built a new subdivision, appropriately named Clayton Park. Mary Clayton died in 1907.

Is there a deadline for applications?

No, applications are accepted throughout the year. A committee reviews each application and makes recommendations to Regional Council who approve all name suggestions twice a year. Approved names will either be used immediately or put on a commemorative names list for future use.

Who can apply?


Anyone can apply for a commemorative name.

Where will the names be used?

We are looking for names for streets, parks, park features, buildings, commercial vessels and ferries in HRM. New developments will pick 50% of their street names from our list of commemorative names. Applicants can specify the communities where they would like to see their name applied.

Free In-Line Skating at the Emera Oval

HRM is pleased to offer free in-line skating at the Emera Oval on the North Common. Regional Council approved the program that allows residents to borrow in-line skates, helmets, wrist guards and knee pads for free. A valid Government issued photo ID is required to borrow the inline skates and helmets. Participants that are in-line skating or cycling on the Emera Oval must wear a helmet, according to provincial regulations.



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There are opportunities for public in-line skates each day during the summer, until August 31. Public skates are weather dependent, and special events may be taking place at the Emera Oval, so residents are encouraged to visit skatehrm.ca to view a calendar with in-line skate times, as well as other events. The Emera Oval hotline 490-2347, will be regularly updated with schedule changes. The Emera Oval is also open daily for general recreational use.

School Review Committee Seeks Public Input

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development has formed a committee to develop a new school review process. The committee has been tasked with developing a discussion paper by September and is currently seeking public input on potential changes.

The deadline for submissions is July 31. Once a discussion paper has been drafted it will be made public and feedback from parents, school boards, communities and municipalities will be sought before any decision is made. A new school review process is expected to be in place by next spring.







With the beautiful summer weather upon us, HRM Partners in Policing remind the public not to leave valuables in a vehicle while it's unattended, especially at parks, beaches or hiking areas.

Every summer, when people are visiting beaches, parks and hiking areas, there's an increase in the number of thefts from vehicles parked at those locations. These thefts are generally a crime of opportunity, with the sight of items being a temptation for would-be thieves. Police recommend that citizens remove all items from their vehicles. If it's absolutely necessary to leave items in your vehicle, they should be locked in the trunk out of plain view before arriving at your destination.
