

Participate in the Centre Plan Public Consultation Process

The Halifax Regional Municipality is pleased to have initiated the next phase of the Centre Plan public consultation process, one of the most exciting and impactful municipal planning processes to be undertaken since the HRMbyDesign Downtown Plan approved in 2009.

The Centre Plan is phase three of HRMbyDesign, following the establishment of the overall Regional Centre vision and principles in phase one and the creation of the Downtown Halifax Plan in phase two. Taken as a whole, the three phases present a vision of a dense, livable and prosperous Regional Centre (Dartmouth and Halifax urban core) that will create sustained social, economic and environmental benefits across the entire municipality.

The objective of the Centre Plan is to consolidate existing municipal planning strategies and land use by-laws for the Regional Centre into one combined policy and by-law set. Many of these documents are out of date, and do not reflect existing or forecasted social, environmental and economic conditions. New policies will protect the scale and character of existing neighbourhoods while removing existing barriers to well-designed and appropriately scaled development.

Through the online portal, residents can review project background and research material, and provide feedback through questions and answers and comments in the discussion forums section of the site.

Annual Fall Leaf Cleanup Program



Autumn is in full swing in the Halifax region and residents are once again encouraged to help city staff keep the

streets, sidewalks and public walkways clear of fallen leaves.

The annual Fall Leaf Cleanup Program began on Monday, November 16. Crews will be collecting and removing the leaves from streets in the heavily treed areas of the former City of Halifax first, and as required in other areas of the urban core boundary of the Halifax region. This service will happen only once on a street-by-street basis.

The municipality is asking for your cooperation to efficiently complete this program. Temporary No Parking signs will be placed in neighbourhoods prior to cleanup in that area. In order to facilitate proper cleanup, residents are asked to abide by those signs and not park on the street.

The potential for street flooding is greatly increased when catch basins are clogged with leaves and debris. Residents are also asked to respect municipal by-laws that prohibit the sweeping or depositing of leaves along the gutter of the street or in the roadway.

Cleanup on private property is the responsibility of the property owner. Leaves and yard waste are collected on regular green cart (organics) collection weeks. Leaves and yard waste are permitted in the green cart and any excess should be placed in large paper bags.

Each household or business can place a maximum of 20 bags at the curb on their respective collection days. Each bag should weigh no more than 25 kilograms (55 pounds). Residents are reminded that grass clippings are not accepted in the green bin or bags. For tips on grasscycling, visit http://www.halifax.ca/recycle/grasscycling.php.

Municipality will accept Excess Leaf and Yard Waste in Plastic Bags

The Halifax Regional Municipality is advising residents that effective immediately clear and orange plastic bags, in addition to large paper bags, will be accepted for the curbside collection of excess leaf and yard waste materials.

Excess leaf and yard waste materials were to be placed curbside in paper bags only as part of a number of amendments to By-law S-600 *Respecting Solid Waste Collection and Disposal*, that came into effect on August 1, 2015. However, the program changes have been so successful that local retailers have been unable to keep up with high demand for the large paper bags, and we understand residents are struggling to properly prepare this material for collection curbside.

The municipality will reintroduce the requirement to use only large paper bags for excess leaf and yard waste in the spring 2016. This will allow more time for our retailers to ensure they can maintain an adequate supply of bags for sale throughout the region.

Seniors Snow Removal Program



Registration for the Seniors' Snow Removal Program has started. The application is available online now at

www.ymcahrm.ns.ca and the number to call is 902-483-3678.

Application Deadline is December 1st, 2015. This is a first come first served process, if the maximum is met before the December 1st deadline the program will close. It is important that only applications with proper documentation will be considered for the program.

Residential Property Tax Exemption

The program is now open for the current 2015/16 fiscal year. Halifax Regional Municipality can help homeowners pay their property tax through a payment plan, a property tax rebate, or deferral of property taxes (payment is put off to a later date). These programs are available to all homeowners with a combined household income of \$32,000 or less a year who live within the boundary of Halifax Regional Municipality. There are different programs to choose from depending on a person's needs. It is important that you know what choices exist.

You can have your exemption award direct deposited to your bank account by completing the payment registration form and returning it with your application and a **Void Cheque**.

The 2015-16 Residential Property Tax Exemption Application form and a Guide are available each year from HRM Customer Service Centers, the HRM Call Centre, the HRM Financial Services Department and on this website. Each year an advertisement is placed in the newspaper to inform the public that the program is open for applications. After you have filed your personal income tax for the current income tax year 2014 filed in April 2015 and have received the Notice of Assessment back from Canada Customs and Revenue Agency confirming your income, you can then complete your application. A copy of this must be submitted with your application form as confirmation of income is *required.* For more information about the program visit http://www.halifax.ca/taxes/exemption/

Heating Assistance Rebate Program

The Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP) provides help to lower-income Nova Scotians with the cost of home heating. You qualify for this program if you pay a heating bill at your current address and meet ONE of the following criteria:

- live alone with an income of \$27,000 or less;
- live with others and have a combined income of \$42,000 or less;
- receive Income Assistance from the Department of Community Services; or,
- receive the Guaranteed Income Supplement from Service Canada.

You must apply by March 31, 2016 to receive a rebate.
