Urban Forest Master Plan – Tree Planting in District 6

Halifax Regional Council approved HRM's Urban Forest Master Plan (UFMP) in 2012. Pursuant to that time, thousands of street trees have been planted with the goal of an additional 1,600 trees for 2016 including 100 trees for District 6 on sections of Highfield Park Drive, Strath Lane, Montebello, McCarthy Street and Raymoor Drive. Nineteen different tree species have been selected. HRM's urban forest consists of all trees within the urban core. The goal of the plan is to ensure a sustainable future for our urban forest. In the years to come these trees will beautify the neighbourhood and grow tall to form a protective canopy cover, benefiting our city as a whole. The UFMP tree planting project is being monitored by participants at Dalhousie University's School for Resource and Environmental Studies. Monitoring crews will be visiting neighbourhoods to evaluate the ongoing progress of the new street trees. Please be advised, that you can report any tree issues to our Citizen Contact Centre at 311. Crime Information Community Meeting

On May 25, 2016 Constituents of District 6 and District 3 were invited to attend a Crime Information community meeting at the Woodlawn Church Hall with Councillor Mancini, Councillor Karsten and representatives from Halifax Regional Police, Cst. Dan Berrigan and Insp. Don Moser. The purpose of this meeting was to provide an open house atmosphere where residents could share their concerns with recent neighbourhood violence while Councillors and Halifax Regional Police could provide feedback, suggest solutions and offer preventative information to help alleviate current and future issues. As follow up to this meeting, we have compiled tips for you on crime prevention from our Halifax.ca website.

There are many ways in which each of us can help to deter crime in our neighbourhoods. It's important to be the "Eyes and Ears" in your neighbourhood because as a community member, you're in the best position to know if there is an issue impacting safety in your neighbourhood.

To report a crime call:

911 - emergency or crime in progress

490-5020 (490-7252 TTY) - non-emergency requiring an officer to be dispatched

902-490-5016 - to file an incident report. You can also report minor crime online

To provide information on a crime anonymously, contact Crimestoppers at 1-800-222-TIPS (8477) or online at www.crimestoppers.ns.ca.

1-877-357-2337 (toll free) - to report a problem property where illegal activity is occurring. The Province of Nova Scotia Safer Communities & Neighbourhoods Act improves community safety by targeting and, if necessary, shutting down residential and commercial buildings and land that are regularly used for

illegal activities such as producing, selling or using illegal drugs, prostitution, illegal gaming or the unlawful sale and consumption of alcohol.

Starting a Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch is a program aimed at reducing crime in the community. It involves getting to know your neighbours and introducing them to the concept of Neighbourhood Watch. The definition of Neighbourhood Watch can be summarized as good neighbours working together and being alert to the potential of crime in their area before it starts. Citizens are taught how to make their homes less inviting as a target for thieves; how to participate in Operation Identification, making their personal property less desirable to burglars; and how to be alert to suspicious activity in their neighbourhoods. The developers are taking the requests and concerns of the surrounding communities into consideration while completing the build. Residents have communicated their top priorities being supporting the recreation of a vibrant urban centre, develop a new park, trail system and enhance the pedestrian streetscape, provide mobility options to promote bicycle and pedestrian movement throughout the site, provide a range of land uses and building types, celebrate the rich history of the community and provide access and connections to the waterfront.
